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Council takes care of backlog of business

PRINEVILLE — The city council had a quorum at its noon lunch meeting Wednesday, for the first time since the Nov. 29 meeting, and rapidly completed a backlog of official business.

Councilmen accepted an amended description of the property on which the Zbinden warehouse stands, and in rapid action then approved the transfer of the lease of the land involved to W. R. and Aletha Wainwright and Ray and Evelyn Steenson from Zbinden Brothers. The lease transfer is the final step in the lengthy negotiations surrounding sale of the warehouse by Zbinden Brothers.

The council also agreed to ask Lawrence Stratton, county surveyor, for an estimate of cost on surveying all city property which is available for lease for industrial purposes.

In financial dealings, the council approved a maximum of \$300 towards expenses of a ski bus to carry skiers from Prineville to ski areas in the Cascades. It was understood that the Crook county high school ski club will handle arrangements for the bus, which is furnished by the county school system.

The council also accepted its share of the \$319 county civil defense budget which has been proposed by Howard Wilson, county CD director. The city's share is one-third, two-thirds to be paid by the county. Funds are earmarked for expenses for attendance by a qualified individual at a radiological school, and for supplies for civil defense clerical work. The budget was accepted earlier by the county court.

Search ends for Rockefeller son

ALBANY, N. Y. (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller announced in a choked voice today that his youngest son, Michael, 23, had been given up for lost in New Guinea.

Michael disappeared Nov. 19 while trying to swim for shore after his native boat had been swamped and was drifting out to sea in a wild, island-dotted section of Netherlands New Guinea.

Whether he ever made it to shore probably will never be known. But he would have had to fight his way through shark-infested waters and the swamplands of the New Guinea jungles.

Rockefeller made his sad announcement at the close of a press conference.

His smile disappeared, his voice choked and he said he had received a telegram from Gov. P. J. Platteel of Netherlands New Guinea that "the search has been brought to an end."

Platteel's telegram said the entire jungle area had been searched and "even any rumors were thoroughly investigated in-

Portland has new FTC office

PORTLAND (UPI)—A new Federal Trade Commission office has been opened here in the U.S. District Courthouse Building.

Investigator Richard G. Schultz, said the new office, which formerly functioned from Seattle, is part of a nationwide reorganization of the commission.

He said it will deal with complaints concerning fraudulent labeling of textile products, advertising of furs and investigation of fiber contents. He said the purpose of the bureau is to protect consumers.

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
