Griffith wants kayo sock

NEW YORK (UPI) — Tonight's Yuletide TV fight is aptly slated for St. Nicholas Arena, and former welterweight champion Emile Griffith says he'll play Santa Claus and give Isaac Logart a sock—a knockout sock.

Speedy young Griffith of New York is very serious about the kayo sock because he no longer trusts decisions, and because a defeat tonight would deprive him of another shot at the 147-pound crown on March 24.

Matchmaker Teddy Bremner has assured 23-year-old Griffith that if he beats Cuban Logart, former title contender, he will get a title "rubber match" with champion Benny (Kid) Paret, also of Cuba, at Madison Square Garden in March.

Griffith vows to let his own fists be the ring officials from now on and to win every fight on a knockout because in his latest TV bout on Sept. 30 at the Garden, he lost the welterweight title back to Paret on a very unpopular split verdict.

That widely criticized verdict deprived Emile of the title he had won on April 1 by knocking out he is only 28, he has begun to lose his stamina. Fernandez won a lopsided decision.

Knecht, Warren combine for 57

EUGENE (UPI) — Veterans Wally Knecht and Charlie Warren were unbeatable here Friday night.

They combined for 57 points to lead the Oregon Ducks to an 84-72 basketball victory over Fresno State before 2,451 persons.

Knecht, a 6-4 senior, poured in 30 points and Warren, a 6-4 senior forward, hit 27 as the Ducks snapped a three-game losing streak.

Oregon, which now has two wins in five starts this season, took a lead early in the game and never was headed. The Ducks held a 39-31 halftime bulge.

Mike McEerson scored 27 points and Tony Burr tallied 22 to pace the Fresno State attack. The loss was the fourth in 11 contests for the Bulldogs.

Oregon hit 35 of 65 field goal attempts. Fresno State made 26 of 76 field goal attempts. The Ducks held a 47-36 edge in rebounding.

Van named to boss west

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Rookie head coaches Norman Van Brocklin of the Minnesota Vikings and Al Sherman of the New York Giants will be the opposing coaches of the East and West teams in the all-star Pro Bowl football game, managing director Paul Schissler announced today.

Van Brocklin was selected for his work with the Vikings in their first season when he welded a band of rookies and veterans given up by other clubs into a team that surprised pro football followers.

Sherman, in his first season as head coach, guided the Giants to the Eastern Division championship.

Schissler pointed out that this was the first time two first year head coaches have been selected to handle the Eastern and Western Division all-stars in the 12-year history of the Pro Bowl, which will be played Jan. 14 in the Coliseum here.

Sherman and Van Brocklin will each name two assistant coaches as well as selecting one bonus choice for their East and West squads which were chosen by vote of the seven coaches in each division of the National Football League.

Browns sign up tackle Brown

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—The Cleveland Browns were ready for all sorts of confusion today after signing tackle John Brown of Syracuse.

Brown, Cleveland's third draft choice after the 1960 season, becomes the third Brown with the club. He joins head coach Paul Brown, for whom the team was named, and all-pro fullback Jim Brown.

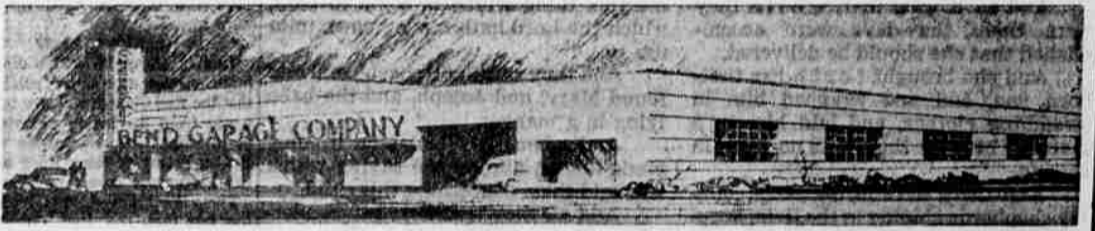
