PRINEVILLE — The Prineville Cowboys, leading most of the way, bounced back from a 45-43 deficit with a minute and one half to play to beat old rival Bend 47-45 here Friday night.

It was a tremendous morale booster for the crippled Pokes, who had won only one previous game this season. But it was a frustrating loss for Bruins, who lost their sixth straight game after three opening-season wins.

Tonight Bend hosts The Dalles, another out-beaten team (only two victories this year), while Prineville plays at Redmond. The latter squad, hitting only 11 for 65 at The Dalles last night, suffered

its sixth loss against four wins, 49-31.

Tonight's Eastern Oregon clashes will have more bearing on the outcome of the Intermountain Conference.

Undeclared Pendleton and Baker square off in an early-season showdown at Baker, while Hermiston, 41-35 victim of Baker Friday night, plays at La Grande, 41-46 loser to Pendleton.

Twice Bend rallied last night to take the lead away from the Pokes, only to falter each time.

Trailing 30-25 early in the third quarter, the Bruins swept to a 32-32 lead midway through that period. But then the Pokes hit nine points while holding Bend scoreless to go ahead 41-33 with less

than six minutes left in the game.

Again Bend fought back. After a Bend time out, Rex Chambers hit a field goal and free throw to close it to 41-36, Mike Barrow hit two free throws to give Prineville a seven-point 43-36 lead.

But Don Underwood hit a jumper from the key, Jan Bowls hit a free throw and Chambers hit from the key as Bend closed the score to 43-41 with 2:25 left.

At the 1:50 mark Chambers hit a beautiful 15-foot hook shot that tied the score and 17 seconds later Underwood was at the free throw line for Bend.

Don calmly hit both gifts as Bend went ahead 45-43. Prineville came roaring back down the floor and with 1:20 left Barrow

tied the score with a field goal.

Bend took the ball down floor, Larson intercepting for Prineville. Bend got the ball back, only to lose it again.

With 46 seconds left Andy Olson fouled Dick Nicholas. Nicholas hit both free throws to give Prineville a 47-45 lead.

But Bend had a couple of chances left. With 25 seconds left Bend's Underwood faked his man beautifully on a one-and-one situation and drove in for the cradle.

The ball looked like a cinch to go in, but spun out at the last second. Prineville got the rebound and, with 16 seconds left, Bend's only strategy left was to foul and hope for a missed free throw.

Olson provided the foul and Prineville's Alan Nielsen furnished the miss.

With Bend coaches screaming for a time out, Larry Gelbrich missed the signal and brought the ball down floor. He was called for traveling at about the midcourt stripe and that was it.

Chambers and Underwood each hit 14 points to lead all the scorers, while Mike Barrow with 13 (7 for 8 from the foul line) and Dick Nicholas with 12 paced Prineville.

Prineville played with two starters out — Joe Myers suffering a sprained ankle Wednesday and Mike Love benched by mononucleosis.

West favored

Pro bowl squads led by Green Bay, New York players

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The 12th annual Pro Bowl game Sunday will not be a replay of the National Football League championship contest which Green Bay won, 37-0, over the New York Giants, but both teams are represented strongly.

The East, coached by Allie Sherman of the Giants, and the West, headed by Norm Van Brocklin of the Minnesota Vikings, each have eight players from the championship teams in the Pro Bowl.

This is probably one of the reasons why the West is favored. Las Vegas, Nev., bookies have made the West a 6½-point favorite. Locally, the Westerners are given a 3-point edge.

Packers on hand to try to demonstrate their superiority again are: quarterback Bart Starr, fullback Jim Taylor, linebacker Bill Forrester, defensive tackle Henry Jordan, center Jim Ringo, cornerback Jess Whitenton, offensive end Max McGee, and offensive tackle Forrest Gregg.

The eight Giants in the Pro Bowl are: quarterback Y.A. Tittle, offensive end Del Shofner, fullback Alex Webster, linebacker Sam Huff, defensive ends Andy Robustelli and Jim Kiteavage, and defensive backs Erich Barnes and Jim Patton.

The West has won seven and the East four of the past 11 games. Sherman plans to start Tittle, a lucky Giant acquisition from the San Francisco Forty Niners, as well as Shofner, a gift from the Los Angeles Rams. The rest of the starting East backfield includes halfbacks Don Perkins of the Dallas Cowboys and Tommy McDonald of the Philadelphia Eagles, and fullback Jim Brown of Cleveland.

Van Brocklin, like Sherman a rookie NFL head coach, plans to start Starr and Taylor, and halfbacks Lenny Moore of the Baltimore Colts and Jon Arnett of the Rams.

Colt quarterback Johnny Unitas, named outstanding player of the past two Pro Bowl games, will be held in reserve by Van Brocklin. For the East, Milt Plum of the Browns is the No. 2 quarterback.

A crowd of 60,000 is expected if a fair weather forecast proves true. The game will be televised nationally (NBC) with a local blackout.

Boutin hits 40 points for record

By United Press International — Jim Boutin shattered the Lewis and Clark scoring record Friday night as he tossed in 40 points in leading the Pioneers to an 84-63 Northwest Conference basketball victory over Pacific at Portland.

Boutin, a 6-6 sophomore center, scored 21 in the first half. He erased the old school record of 39 points set by Ken Servas in 1954.

The victory gave the Pioneers their fourth conference win in as many games. Pacific lost its third in four starts.

In other games Friday night Linfield topped Whitman 87-72 and College of Idaho defeated Willamette 82-58.

Linfield made 53 per cent of its shots from the field in winning its second game against one loss in conference action. Caryll Goetze led the way with 16 points. Whitman has won one out of four games.

College of Idaho evens its record at 2-2 as Bob Moreno scored 20 points. Willamette now has a 1-2 record.

Oregon College of Education made its debut in Oregon Collegiate Conference play with a 35-49 upset victory over Southern Oregon at Monmouth. The Wolves made 19 of 34 shots from the field.

Oregon Tech edged Eastern Oregon 59-57 at Klamath Falls. Sam Smith and Bob Petersen scored 19 and 17 points, respectively, as the Owls led throughout the second half.

Beavers run up ninth straight over Gonzaga

CORVALLIS (UPI) — The Oregon State Beavers ran up their ninth straight basketball win Friday night but it didn't come easily.

They overcame a seven-point deficit in the second half to defeat stubborn Gonzaga 78-64 before 6,004 persons.

It was their 10th victory in 11 starts.

The Beavers, ranked ninth in the nation by United Press International this week, scored 12 straight points midway in the second half to pull out the win.

The Bulldogs held a 40-36 halftime lead and were on top 49-44 when Oregon State reeled off its 12 straight points.

Veteran forward Jay Carly led the way with 22 points, guard Terry Baker tallied 19 and 7-foot sophomore center Mel Counts scored 17 for the Beavers.

Counts put them ahead to stay with a short jump shot with 11:30 to play at 50-49.

The Bulldogs, dropping their sixth decision in 12 starts, were paced by forwards John Gambee and Bob Hunt. Gambee scored 19 and Hunt tallied 16.

Oregon State will meet the improving Portland Pilots tonight. The Pilots defeated Gonzaga at Portland Wednesday night.

Miss first 22 shots

Cold Cats lose to Tribe 49-31

THE DALLES — Few teams have ever been as cold as the Redmond Panthers were in the first 12 minutes against The Dalles Friday night.

The Panthers missed their first 22 shots and wound up on the short end of a 49-31 score as The Dalles posted its first league win of the year and second victory of the season.

At midway through the second period Redmond trailed 13-1. For the next quarter and a half the Panthers stayed even with The Dalles, trailing 29-19 after three quarters.

But then the Indians got hot, outscoring Redmond 20-12 in the last eight minutes to walk away with the win.

The Panthers, who hit on only 11 of 65 field shots for a miserable .169 average Friday, hope their home court proves friendlier tonight when they host the Prineville Cowboys, 47-45 winners over Bend Friday.

Redmond didn't have much better luck shooting free throws against the Indians Friday, hitting only nine of 25 gifts for a .360 mark, while The Dalles made 13 of 18 for a .722 percentage. The Indians also shot much better from the field, hitting 18 of 52 for a .346 percentage.

The Dalles had a slight edge in the rebound department, 41-37, but Redmond got 13 more field shots and seven more free throws.

Fishing season April 21-Oct. 31

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon's general fishing season will run from April 21 to Oct. 31, the State Game Commission decided Friday.

The commission held day-long public hearings in Portland to set this year's tentative regulations. More hearings are scheduled Jan. 28, after which final rules will be announced.

The high Cascades lakes are scheduled to open May 28.

The commission cut the season possession limit on steelhead from 40 to 20 and decided to close the Sandy River to all trout fishing downstream from Truman Bridge at Zigzag.

The commission also came out in favor of closing the Pacific Ocean off the state to sports salmon fishing for two weeks from June 1 to 15. Commercial regulated agencies in Oregon and Washington will be asked to impose a month-long closure of the commercial season from June 1 to 30.

Sponsors of the tournament offer a new automobile for a hole-in-one. But the rules, it developed, applied only to the 18th hole. Bob McAllister aced the fifth hole on the fly Friday—and got nothing except a boost in morale. Billy Casper got a hole-in-one on the 18th on Wednesday — but that was in the pro tournament and didn't count either.

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) — Bob Goalby, the mid-winter golfing specialist from Crystal River, Fla., goes into the third round of the \$25,000 San Diego Open golf tournament today holding a two-stroke lead over the field.

Goalby had a one-under-par 70 to go with his opening 65 for a 135. That's the same score he had after two rounds in the Los Angeles Open — where he finished in a tie for second place.

Tied for second are Gary Player of South Africa and Doug Sanders, Ojai, Calif. Player, with the help of some strong putting, had a 68. But Sanders, with the help of the "greatest iron I've ever hit," had a 66 and they both had 137 scores.

At 138 came Johnny Pott, Ocean Springs, Miss.; Jay Herbert, Miami, Fla.; and Don Masegale, Jacksonville, Tex.
