### Bench leads Celtics' win over Royals

Even the Boston Celtics' second-team seems to be too strong for the rest of the National Basketball Association.  
That was the case again Friday night when Boston coach Red Auerbach was forced to use his bench and it came through brilliantly in a 141-125 victory over the Cincinnati Royals.

The Celtic subs got the call midway in the fourth period because most of the Boston regulars were on the verge of fouling out. Tom Sanders led the group of second stringers, who scored a total of 33 points, most of them in the decisive fourth quarter.

Regular Tom Heinsohn paced the Celtic scorers with 32 points while Oscar Robertson of the Royals was individual high scorer with 33.

Willie Naulls' 35-foot jump shot in the final minute of play gave the New York Knickerbockers a 129-126 win over the St. Louis Hawks.

Down by 18 points at one juncture, the Knicks rallied and went ahead for the first time in the final three minutes of play. Richie Guerin was high man for the Knicks with 31 points. Larry Foust scored 40 points for the Hawks.

Gene Shue and Bailey Howell sparked a late fourth quarter rally that helped the Detroit Pistons to a 102-99 victory over the Chicago Packers. Shue paced the Pistons with 25 points. Individual scoring honors went to Ralph Bellamy, who pumped in 27 points for Chicago.

### Weber resumes bowling lead; Hoover second

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Determined Dick Weber of St. Louis was back in the lead of the \$100,000 21st annual All-Star bowling tournament today as 32 men and women finalists started their last rounds.  
Weber and Dick Hoover, also of St. Louis, have been fighting a back-and-forth battle for the lead through the first 12 rounds of the finals.  
Weber, who led in the early rounds, recaptured first place after the 11th round Friday night. At the end of the evening he had a 241-13 Petersen Point total for the first 12 rounds to 240-18 for Hoover.  
Roy Lown, El Paso, Tex., left-hander, was third with 232-34 points.  
Shirley Garms of Chicago stayed ahead in the women's division 111-26 points. Robbie Frey, Torrance, Calif., was second at 109-33 points and Anita Cantaline, Detroit, was third with 107-18 points.  
There are 16 finalists in each division, and all will bowl three rounds today.  
The top two men and women at the end of the three rounds square off in front of a national (ABC) television audience at 10 p.m. tonight for a three-game match with total pins knocked down the deciding factor for the championship — worth \$15,000 to the top men and \$5,000 to the women's champ.

### NCAA expected to sever ties with AAU group

CHICAGO (UPI) — The NCAA convention votes today on pending legislation and there was little doubt it would virtually sever relations with the AAU and also adopt stronger rules in an effort to prevent future gambling-bribery scandals.  
Amendments to both the constitution and by-laws will come up automatically in today's session, the only voting period during the convention.  
Among them will be a 16-point program aiming at cutting down the chance that gamblers could influence athletes.  
Major Outside Play  
The ban proposals would prohibit organized basketball competition outside the regular season under penalty of permanent ineligibility, extend eligibility requirements to special events including football bowl games, require a transfer student disqualified or suspended for academic or disciplinary reasons to put in two years in residence to become eligible, and urge members to conduct events only on campus or under complete control of campus.  
Another major proposal would put in a national letter of intent, in which colleges could pre-register up to 35 prospective athletes, no more than 20 of them football players, after June 15 annually.  
A student who signed a pre-registration certificate would be ineligible at any other institution for two years and would be unable to compete for more than two years. However, if he enrolled at a small college, without solicitation, he could compete without penalty.  
Would Lose Eligibility  
Another proposal would penalize an athlete his first year of eligibility if he has participated in a non-approved high school all star game.  
Rules committees, under a proposal from Notre Dame, would be required to hold hearings in case of a disputed rules interpretation, and either affirm or reverse the contest officials' decision.  
The convention also will be asked to uphold four penalties issued this week by the policy-making council, and to endorse the authorization of the executive committee and the council for efforts to organize new federations to try to take control of international competition by the United States in track and gymnastics from the AAU.

### German gal wins ladies' Alpine title

GRINDELWALD, Switzerland (UPI) — Heidi Biebl of West Germany, a gold-medal winner in the 1960 Olympics, finished second to Austria's Traudl Hecher in the downhill race of the Grindelwald International Ladies' Ski Meet Friday and thus won the Alpine Combined Championship.  
Miss Biebl, known as Germany's "Golden Girl," placed second in Tuesday's slalom race as well as Friday's downhill, both of which form the Alpine Combined competition.  
Linda Meyers of Mammoth Lakes, Calif., placed sixth in the downhill and was third in the combined standings, behind Miss Biebl and Miss Hecher.  
Miss Hecher, an 18-year-old secretary from Innsbruck, Austria, was timed in one minute, 49 seconds in the downhill race which wound up the ladies' competition. The course was 1,840 meters with 29 gates and a vertical drop of 430 meters.  
Among the other American girls in the field of 84 contestants, Barbara Ferries of Houghton, Mich., was 11th in the downhill in 1:44.6; Joan Hannah of Franconia, N. H., and Jean Saubert of Lakeview, Ore., were tied for 16th place in 1:45.4, and Margo Walters of Sandy, Utah, was 52nd in 1:51.2.

### Olson wins, sets bout next week

HONOLULU (UPI) — Former middleweight king Bobo Olson, now fighting as a light-heavyweight, disposed of one challenger Friday night and promptly announced another fight for next week.  
Olson scored a lopsided decision over Al (Tiger) Williams of Los Angeles in a fast-paced 10-rounder at Civic Auditorium.  
The ex-champ, scaling a hefty 175, was given eight rounds over Williams, 168. The first and fifth stanzas were called even.  
Immediately after the fight, promoter Sam Ichinose announced that Olson would meet Artie Dixon next Friday in another 10-rounder.  
In Friday night's fight, Olson concentrated on his usual fast body attack in the first five rounds, with Williams giving back almost as much as he was taking.  
But in the sixth, Olson opened with sharp combinations and only the bell prevented a knockout.  
Olson dominated the rest of the going and shot for a knockout in the last round, rocking Williams with both hands to the head.

### PARNELL NAMED PILOT

### Plans for Christmas Valley project eyed by soil group

SILVER LAKE — The land development activities of the M. Pean Phillips Company's Christmas Valley project have added several facets to the preparation of the annual work plan of the Fort Rock-Silver Lake Soil Conservation District. Meeting in Silver Lake on January 4, district supervisors, assisted by representatives of several government agencies, took stock of help available in forwarding goals previously set by the district.  
Warren Morton, development planner for the Christmas Valley project, indicated that probably a hundred persons would be living on Phillips Company tracts by late summer. Land is being subdivided and sold in parcels as small as 20 acres to purchasers, largely Californians.  
Morton and Harold Boyer, construction superintendent for the land development firm, and Oris Rudd, Lake County Extension Agent, discussed the possible preparation of a paper by the extension service to acquaint new land purchasers with cropping and tillage practices here.  
Three Types Noted  
Rudd pointed out that correspondence to his office from purchasers of Christmas Valley land reveals three types — those interested in an acreage for retirement purposes, purchasers of larger acreages of 160 or more, who expect to farm, and purchasers of small tracts who expect to farm. Rudd expressed concern over the latter group and problems likely to confront them.  
Letters now reaching the extension office in Lakeview indicate that writer has purchased land, then wants to know how to transform sagebrush land into productive fields with pump irrigation.  
Also suggested for extension cooperation was a serious study of mint production; also: grazing production of irrigated pastures and a look at the effect of taxation on certain land improvements.

### Plowing brushland for range re-seeding is on the way out, stated

Carl W. Simpson of Lakeview, Supervisor, Fremont National Forest, pointing out that spraying and follow-up with a rangeland type drill equipped with deep furrow openers is far less costly and is a technique that has been getting good results.  
The spraying and seeding of 3500 acres of Bureau of Land Management administered land on the Viewpoint Ranches, Inc. allotment is well underway, with about 1500 acres seeded, according to M. T. Shrode, BLM range conservationist.  
Trow Long, manager of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce, reviewed activities of his organization and pointed out the need for active chamber membership in north Lake County.  
Bud Parks presided at the meeting in the absence of Eston Porter, district chairman, who was in Pendleton undergoing surgery.

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
