

Urban affairs fight launched

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Presilent Kennedy plunged into a show down fight with Congress today in an emphatic bid to win approval of a new cabinet-level department of urban affairs.

The President was seeking to bypass the House Rules Committee, which voted 9-6 against a plan to create the department through legislation.

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger told reporters presidential aides were drafting a reorganization plan in hopes of sending it to Congress today. A reorganization plan takes effect automatically in 60 days unless either the House

or Senate vetoes it. Salinger said presidential aides started work on the reorganiza-tion plan Wednesday a few minutes after Kennedy told his news conference he would send the


