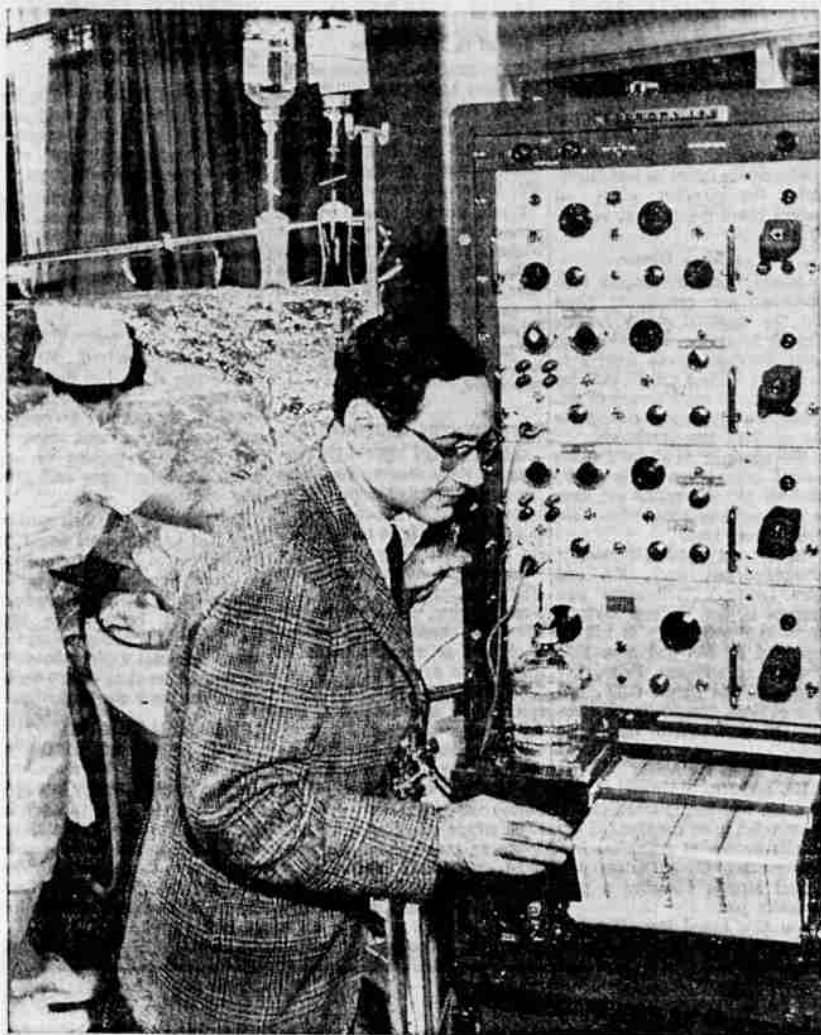

Market fails to match Glenn

NEW YORK (UPI)—The stock market failed Tuesday to match the high flying success of astronaut John Glenn as had been expected.

Where there were gains, they were generally in the aerospace issues. Experts had expected a successful launching to send the market higher, and were surprised by unspectacular response.

Among the gainers were Beckman, RCA, Zenith, IBM, General Dynamics, North American Aviation and United Aircraft, which added about one point each, and Minneapolis-Honeywell which rose better than 2.

"What does humanity gain by that?" he said when asked for comment on the Glenn flight. "They should do something about making hair grow."

Space success brings messages from many parts of the world

Lt. Col. John H. Glenn's three trips around the earth wrapped the world in a glow of wonder, awe and admiration today.

From north, south, east and west congratulations and expressions of delight with America's space achievement gushed forth spontaneously.

Statesmen calculated the political implications of an American joining two Russians in an exclusive club of humans who have orbited the earth in space.

Scientists boldly spoke of the next long step—the race to the moon.

The man in the street, allowed to follow the space spectacular live from launch to recovery, spoke of little else but the coolness of the freckle-faced, 40-year-old astronaut.

Congratulations Pour In

Into the White House in Washington poured messages of congratulations from United Nations Acting Secretary General Thant, Argentine President Arturo Frondizi, Brazilian President Joao Goulart, Chilean President Jorge Alessandri, Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Queen Elizabeth of Britain, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, Australian Prime Minister Robert Menzies, Swedish Prime Minister Tage Erlander, West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt, French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville, Italian Foreign Minister Antonio Segni, Japanese Premier Hayato Ikeda, Spain's Generalissimo Francisco Franco and many others.

Pope John XXIII was depicted as "very happy" at the prospect of another step toward the peaceful use of outer space. The Vatican prayed for Glenn, a Presbyterian while he was in orbit.

Communist reaction varied from country to country.

Soviet radio and television gave unusual coverage to the feat and expressed congratulations, but usually coupled with a reminder that two Soviet cosmonauts had done it first—one of them for 17 orbits.

Show Glenn's Picture

Soviet television showed a picture of Glenn and Moscow Radio played a recording of some of his voice transmissions from the Friendship 7 capsule.

The recovery occurred at 11 p.m. Moscow time Tuesday, too late for Soviet morning papers.

The Polish, East German, Hungarian and Czech radios or news agencies also carried accounts of

the orbit. Western radio networks such as the British Broadcasting Corp., Voice of America and Radio Free Europe carried more details behind the Iron Curtain.

Havana Radio mentioned Glenn's takeoff Tuesday in 45 words, adding pointedly that it had been postponed 10 times. Successful completion of the flight was mentioned Tuesday night in a newscast which compared it favorably with "Soviet technique."

Peking Radio chose to ignore the space flight but presumably some in Communist China heard of it through the Voice of America's Mandarin dialect broadcast.

Of all the Communist countries, Czechoslovakia expressed greatest enthusiasm, Prague Radio spoke of Glenn's "heroic achievement" and the "great success for American science and technique."

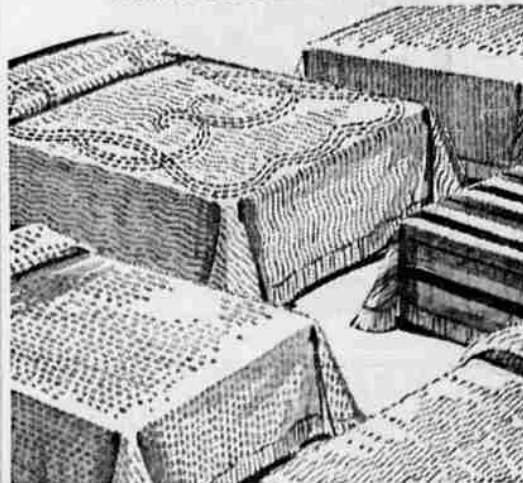

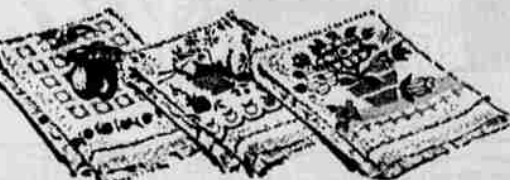
