Fiber glass pole tested

NEW YORK (UPI)—Sports Illustrated Magazine said today that tests it sponsored have shown that the performance of the fiber glass vaulting pole "closely approximates the performances of the traditional bamboo pole."

The magazine said tests were conducted by the Johns-Manville Research Laboratory.

It said it found that the bamboo pole was the most resilient, and also returned the most quickly to its original shape after bending. However, it also found that 20-pound weight applied to a fiber glass pole "slipped" a 2-pound bag 40 inches as against 32 1/2 inches for bamboo, 28 inches for steel, and 23 inches for aluminum.

Dark may use Mays on third

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Willie Mays at third base?

Manager Alvin Dark of the San Francisco Giants is thinking of such a drastic shift but hastens to point out, "I'm just speculating."

The idea bubbled to the surface Tuesday during a press conference where Dark went over his club position by position. Several pencils suddenly broke as Dark ventured in his soft drawl:

"Jim Davenport, our third baseman, will work out some at second base. Because if we ran into a second base problem, Jim could play there, I'd move Willie Mays in to third base and put Felipe Alou in center field."

Over the stunned silence, Dark added:

"I'm not saying this will happen, I'm just speculating."

And he pointed out that he likes to have a versatile squad.

"Jose Pagan, our shortstop, played some good outfield for us last season," Dark said.

Most of the second base chores were handled last year by Joe Amalfitano, now long gone to the Houston Colt 45's for \$125,000. Charley Hiller, who started at the spot as a rookie last season, batted only .238. He is back for the job this season.

But second base is not Dark's biggest headache.

"Second base is not the key to the pennant," he said. "You don't need a great second baseman to win it. Pitching is the key to any pennant."

NCAA cage pairings set

NEW YORK (UPI)—The first round pairings for the NCAA basketball tournament:

East Regionals at Philadelphia, March 12—NYU (13-3) vs. Yankee Conference champion, Villanova (16-4) vs. Southern Conference champion, Atlantic Coast Conf. champ, member-at-large (probably Ivy League champ).

Winners qualify for regional at College Park, Md., March 16-17, where ACC-Ivy winner meets Middle Atlantic Conference champ and other Philadelphia winners meet each other.

Midwest Regionals at Lexington, Ky., March 12—Bowling Green (19-2) vs. Butler (19-5), Western Kentucky (13-6) vs. Detroit (15-4). (Winners qualify for regional at Iowa City, March 16-17, where Southeastern Conference champ meets Bowling Green-Butler winner and Big Ten champ meets Detroit-Western Kentucky winner.)

Midwest Regionals (Date and site to be announced later)—Air Force (13-4) vs. Southwest Conference champ, Creighton (16-4) vs. member-at-large. (Winners qualify for regional at Manhattan, Kan., March 16-17, where Air Force-Southwest winner meets the Big Eight champ and Creighton-at-large winner meets the Missouri Valley Conference champ.)

Far West Regionals (Date and site to be announced later)—Oregon State (17-3) vs. Seattle (14-8), Arizona State (20-3) vs. Skyline Conference champ. (Winners qualify for regional at Provo, Utah, March 16-17, where Seattle-Oregon St. winner meets Big Five champion and Arizona St.-Skyline winner meets the West Coast AC champ.)
