REDMOND — The Redmond Panthers pulled a torrid "Civil War battle" out of the fire to beat Bend 66-61 in overtime here Friday night, and the guy that had the most to do with it was a little 5-7 hustler — Brian Massey.

The wild game had seen Bend rally from a 47-30 deficit to tie the score 58-58 with 16 seconds left and send the game into an overtime period.

Shortly after the extra period

opened, Bend's Larry Gelbrich was fouled by Redmond's Bill Peterson. Gelbrich missed his first try, but dropped in his second to put Bend ahead 59-58.

The Panthers came roaring back, Massey, with his back to his man, whirled clockwise and drove in for a layup. Bend missed its shot and Redmond center Bill Frenzel was fouled by Gelbrich.

Frenzel made both foul shots to make it 62-59. Massey intercepted a Bruin pass and the Cats came roaring back. Don Watrous took a pass, tried a volleyball shot and swished it in. Gary McKinney cut it to 64-61 with a basket for Bend, and the Bruins still had life.

But another Bend offensive try missed, Massey got the ball and was fouled by Jack Allison. Brian calmly hit both of his free throws and Redmond was in.

The victory was Redmond's second in three games with Bend this season — giving Redmond the rubber match. The Panthers also beat Bend in football.

Both teams were keyed up, with Rex Chambers of Bend and Ed Sturza of Redmond engaging

in a real offensive battle that ignited into more of a "personal" battle with 16 seconds to go in regulation time.

It was at that time that both men got in some pretty good punches, and both were tossed out with technicals charged to both.

The score was 58-56 Redmond at the time. A personal foul had also been assessed against Sturza just prior to the fisticuff flurvy. Bend's Jan Bowlus came in to take over for Chambers and calmly tossed in both gifts on a one-and-one foul situation to tie the game with 16 seconds left.

Following the technical fouls, the two teams lined up for the center circle jump, with Redmond getting the tip. But the Cats couldn't score and the game went into overtime.

It was Massey who got Redmond off to a fast start in the beginning, hitting his first two shots, The Panthers glided along with a substantial lead from then on, and, with 2:18 remaining in the third quarter, were enjoying a 47-31 margin.

The Pokes had been using a pressing defense almost the entire

game, and Redmond Coach Buck Kauffman decided to give his first-line troops a rest.

Bend took advantage of this move by outscoring Redmond 8-0 in the next two minutes and closed the gap to 47-39.

Kauffman tossed his first stringers back into the fray, but now the Bruins were hot. At the start of the first quarter they hit three quick field goals to make it 47-45 Redmond.

Redmond rallied for five straight points and a 52-45 lead. Chambers, suddenly all over the floor, hit seven straight points to make it 52-41 with 3:33 left.

At the three-minute mark, Chambers connected again — his 28th point to give Bend its first lead of the game, 54-52.

Massey and Jerry Corwin got four points back for Redmond, but Bend's McKinney tied it up at 56 all by breaking loose underneath with a minute and one half left.

With 1:17 left, Massey hit a free throw, and Frenzel followed with a free throw with 26 seconds left.

That made it 56-56, and when the Panthers got the ball again it looked like they were fairly safe.

Then the flareup with 16 seconds to go, Bowlus' two free throws and the overtime struggle.

It was a tremendous game between two squads that really wanted a win bad. Sturza was brilliant on the boards and hit 15 points — 11 in the first half.

Bend kept in the game via the free throw route, hitting 25 of 33 for the night. But Redmond's superiority on the boards, despite its height disadvantage, gave the Panthers 20 more shots from the field and they beat Bend in the field goal department 25-18.

Bend salvaged a little of the night by winning the Jayvee game 41-30 — with the Bend Jayvees ending the season with a 10-9 record under new coach Bill Bauer.

A couple of Canadian entries in the Western Hockey League failed to overwhelm their American visitors with hospitality last night in WHL play.

Edmonton, top dog in the Northern Division, took its second straight from Southern Division leader Portland with a 2-0 shutout at Edmonton. And Vancouver, which whips itself into a winning fury about once every four games, bumped Los Angeles 3-3 at Vancouver.

Edmonton scored its two goals in the third period of a tightly-played contest. At one point in the first period three Edmonton skaters were in the penalty box but the remaining three managed to hold off the Portland charges.

Howie Young slapped in the Flyers' first goal on a pass from Ed Joyal, and Milly McNeill added the insurance tally five minutes later on a rebound from a shot by Joyal.

Last-minute strategy backfired for the Los Angeles six. The Blades were one goal down as the game neared its conclusion and pulled goalie Marcel Pelletier out of the net for an extra forward. But the move fizzled when Les Hunt poked a Vancouver goal into the empty net to stifle the Blades' hopes.

The win was only the fourth for Vancouver in their last 22 tries.

Sub fighters in TV bout

Win western crown

Ex-West Virginia aces pace Lakers

The National Basketball Association had its first new Western Division champion in six years today and it took a pair of former West Virginia greets to accomplish the trick for Los Angeles.

Coach Fred Schaus and Jerry West climaxed the Lakers long drive to succeed St. Louis as Western titlist Friday night as Los Angeles defeated Chicago, 124-117, in an overtime clincher.

St. Louis had won every year since the 1956-57 season.

Schaus played and coached at the University of West Virginia before coming to the Lakers and his star pupil during a successful Mountaineer reign was All America Jerry West.

West's basket with 13 seconds remaining in regulation time tied the score at 110-110 and he added four quick ones in the extra session as part of his high of 39 points in the game played at Louisville, Ky.

Boston, only a shade away from annexing its sixth straight Eastern championship, walloped Syracuse, 121-107, in an afternoon game while evening encounters were rounded out with New York topping St. Louis, 130-118, and Cincinnati throttling and Detroit Pistons, 124-120.

Tom Heinsohn tallied 31 points for Boston as the Celtics trimmed their magic number to four for the division title. Dave Gambee's 26-point effort was high for Syracuse.

Willie Naulls and Richie Guerin, the Knicks' high-scoring pair, tallied 33 and 32 points, respectively, in beating an injury-riddled Hawk outfit. Cliff Hagan netted 35 points for St. Louis.

Second-place Cincinnati, hoping its mastery over third-place Detroit would continue right through the playoffs, received a 39-point performance from Oscar Robertson while Bailey Howell tallied 27 for the Pistons.
