## Status of public funds is no guarantee they will be managed or spent wisely

As was suspected at the time of the action, there has been a rumble of criticism directed at the action of the Oregon Constitutional Revision Commision in voting to remove highway fund earmarking from the state's basic legal document. The commission voted to place the matter in the statutes.

The commission's vote, if we interpret accurately the sense of the meeting at which the vote was taken, was largely predicated upon two points.

First, earmarking of funds for special purposes is not found in the federal constitution or the constitutions of most states. It is not found in any of the modern state constitutions. Second, road funds are the only revenues so carmarked in Oregon; all other funds are taken care of by statute, although most of the state's revenues are designated for special purposes of one sort or another.

Under these circumstances, it seemed to make little sense to make such a sacred cow of highway funds, rather than game funds, for an example, or

Fears have been expressed that unless the funds are set aside by the constitution, there may be mismanagement in their handling, or the legislature may divert them to other uses.

The first of these fears is, in our opinion at least, completely unjustified. Earmarking, constitutional or otherwise, is no guarantee of good managesuccess will be measured by the caliber of the men doing the managing, not by any provisions which set them aside for one purpose or another.

A relatively quick survey of various state highway fund scandals over the past will quickly show that money can be misspent regardless of constitution. be misspent, regardless of constitution- the first man they will meet will al or statutory provisions to the contrary. #### On that COC bond issue

Directors of the new Central Oregon College district last night unanimously voted to ask approval, at the May 18 primary election, of a \$125,000 bond issue for construction of buildings when the college site is finally selected.

Under a law passed by the 1961 legislature, the state will pay three-fourths of building costs, exclusive of furniture and fixtures, and site acquisition and development costs. The state department of education has set aside \$255,000 for matching purposes during the current state fiscal bi-ennium.

### Oilmen believed hunting 'traps'

Leasing activity by oil companies is a source of much conjecture in Oregon west of the Cascades.

Especially interesting is the fact that a number of companies are blocking off land close to the western Cascade foothills. In the Eugene area there was even a penetration of the foothills well up the Lower McKenzie River valley.

What is the significance of the foothill leasing? Company geologists have the answer, of course, but they are not talking.

But geology of the area does provide at least part of the answer.

Long cons ago warm waters of the ancient Pacific oceans washed the western foothills of the volcanic Westorn Cascades, ancestral to the present Bigh Cascades. Oceans of two epochs massed their sediments in the trough, carlier flanked by a long line of highly

volcanic isles in the west.

Marine shells in rocks of the old Willamette basin tell part of the story of the ancient seas. Those shells are found in formations under Eugene and in the country north to Salem.

It is evident that the old Eocene-Oligocene seas were prolific of marine life-the stuff from which earth oils are presumed to have been derived.

As the Willamette basin marine beds piled up in the Coast Range-Cascade trough, the volcanic Cascades continued to build in the west. In places, the Columbia or Cascade lava covered the upturned edges of the ocean beds.

These conditions were ideal for oil "traps" close to the Cascade foothills. Oilmen are interested in such possible oil traps
