

## Edmonton wins northern title in hockey race

Meet the Western Hockey League's Northern and Southern Division champions for 1962—Edmonton and Portland.

Portland clinched its Southern Division crown several days ago and Edmonton Tuesday night gained a lock on the Northern Division title with a 9-3 win over second-place Seattle.

Ed Joyal and Doug Messier each turned in hat tricks for Edmonton, which built up a 5-0 lead after two periods.

Portland fattened its division lead with a crucial 6-3 win over Los Angeles that may have clanked the cellar door permanently on the Blades.

Veteran defenseman Bill Davidson led the Bucs with two goals and one assist, while Wally Hergesheimer scored two for Los Angeles.

A crowd of "only" 8,668 saw the game—first time since Jan. 27 that the Los Angeles attendance has been under 10,000.

The Blades now have two games left and trail third place San Francisco by two points. The Seals have three contests left. Los Angeles is at San Francisco tonight in a game expected to crack the Seals' attendance record.

Third place carries with it a spot in the play-offs.

Vancouver, deep in the Northern Division basement, turned in one of its best games in an 8-5 victory over Spokane.

## Duquesne trips top-seeded NIT squad Bradley

NEW YORK (UPI)—Duquesne, darkhorse of the National Invitational Basketball Tournament, may have trouble trying to stop big Leroy Ellis and St. John's in the semi-finals Thursday night at Madison Square Garden.

The Iron Dukes pulled the biggest upset of the tournament in defeating top-seeded Bradley, 89-85, Tuesday night before St. John's belted Holy Cross, 89-74, in quest of its fourth NIT championship.

Loyola of Chicago and Dayton, which gained the semi-final round on Saturday, meet in the other half of Thursday's doubleheader.

Coach Red Manning of Duquesne made no secret of the fact that he was hoping that St. John's would lose to Holy Cross because "I don't know if we can handle that big guy (Ellis)."

**Pro Scouts On Hand**  
The 6-10 Ellis broke open the St. John's-Holy Cross game by scoring 21 of his 29 points in the second half before a crowd of 16,398, including an array of pro scouts and coaches who rate the Redmen center a top prospect.

While Manning is pondering how to stop Ellis, Coach Joe Lapchick of St. John's has a smaller problem — how to cope with Willie Somerset — but one which could mean the difference in winning or losing. Somerset, a 5-10 muscular sophomore, scored 28 points and was all over the court, dribbling, hustling and setting up plays against Bradley.

"He's the best guard I've seen in years," said Lapchick. "He's like a Mack truck. Our guards, either (Ivan) Kovac or (Donnie) Burks, will be like a fly on his back."

**Accurate Shooting**  
Manning, who's a stickler for defense, will have more than Ellis to stop Thursday night. St. John's scored better than 60 per cent from the field against Holy Cross. Ellis hit on 13 of 19; Willie Hall connected on 7 of 9 for 14 points and Kovac made 6 of 11 and 15 points.

St. John's enjoyed a sizable lead most of the way against the Crusaders as Hall pressured Jack (The Shot) Foley. Foley, the nation's No. 3 scorer, had nine points at halftime and didn't get going until the game was out of reach, winding up with 35 points.

The Redmen led 74-53 with five minutes to go before Foley led the Crusaders' late surge.

**Eagles swap two to 'Skins**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Washington Redskins traded center Jim Schradler and defensive back Ben Scott to the Philadelphia Eagles today for halfback Billy Barnes and defensive safety Bob Freeman.

The two-for-two swap gave the Redskins one of the National Football League's top offensive backs in Barnes. But the Eagles, in acquiring Schradler, got hefty help in bolstering their below-par offensive line.

Barnes and Schradler were the key men in the deal. The former Wake Forest back has scored 28 touchdowns in his five years with Philadelphia and he will form a potent one-two punch in the Redskins' backfield with former Cleveland Browns' star Bobby Mitchell.

Schradler, an excellent blocker who played for Notre Dame, has been one of the NFL's top-rated centers during his seven-year pro career. Both Scott and Freeman are regarded as above-average defensive backs. Scott, a former Maryland star who plays wingback, is noted as a deadly tackler and one of the league's most colorful players. But Washington Coach Bill McPeak said he was more than happy to get Freeman, in hopes that the ex-Auburn back will plug holes in his pass defense.
