**Food sanitation schools planned**

Annual food sanitation schools sponsored by the Tri-County Health Department, will be held the first week in April. All restaurant operators and employees, school lunchroom personnel and kitchen workers in hospitals, nursing homes and homes for the aged are invited to attend.  
 The two-part school will be given in Bend, Redmond, Prineville and Madras, according to A. W. Westfall, sanitarian.

Dates for Bend and Redmond are Tuesday, April 3, and Tuesday, April 10. Duplicate sessions will be held in Bend in the district courtroom at the county courthouse, at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on each date. Evening sessions will be held at Milton's Banquet Room, Redmond, at 8 o'clock.

The sessions in Madras will be Wednesday, April 4, and Wednesday, April 11, at 2 p.m. at the Chief Theater.

Dates for Prineville are Thursday, April 5, and Thursday, April 12, with sessions to be held at 2:30 p.m. at the Pine Theater.

Each person attending both the first and second sessions will receive a certificate.  
 The programs will feature color films and slides pertaining to restaurant sanitation. At each session, there will be a discussion period. Pictures for the slides were taken in local restaurants.

The Oregon State Board of Health is co-sponsoring the school with the health department.

**Bend men take course at OSU**

**OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY** — Two men from the Bend area completed a special three-day Water Works Operators Short School this week at Oregon State University.

They are Edward C. Spring and Clifford Brown of the Bend Water Department.

The school is offered by the college's school of engineering each year as a service to cities, water districts, and water utility companies. Purposes are to promote efficient and economical operation of water supply systems and safeguard the public health in water supplies.

Sponsors with the college are the State Board of Health, League of Oregon Cities, and the Pacific Northwest Section of the American Waterworks Association. A total of 135 water superintendents, water purification plant operators, and other waterworks employees attended this year's course.

**Zoning petition receives okay**

The Deschutes County Planning Commission Tuesday approved a petition for zoning Blakley Heights and Ward Tracts west of Highway 97.

The action was taken on motion of Albert Cook, who rescinded his earlier motion that the area be extended to Parrell Road.

Bradley Fancher, chairman, suggested that a committee be formed to study the problem and determine the wording of the zoning ordinance. Three members of the planning group and three residents of the Blakley Heights area will be appointed, he indicated.

Designation of a zone type was not made. It is the ultimate goal of the sponsors of the petition to halt commercial development in that area, except along the highway, although not interfering with businesses now in existence.

A map of the area, prepared by Aubrey Perry, county surveyor, was presented.

As usual, there was some talk of the plausibility of engaging a professional planner. Opinion of members was divided, as to the advisability of asking the county budget committee for a substantial sum and seeking matching federal funds.

Members present were Fancher, Cook, Laddie Jordan, Oscar Brucker, Del Davis and Don Con-

ner. Ex-officio members attending were James McAllister, secretary; A. W. Westfall, tri-county sanitarian; Perry, Judge D. L. Penhollow and Commissioners George Baker and Fred Shepard. Joan Hamm attended as liaison representative of the Bend Planning Commission.
