When she attended Bend High School, she played in the orchestra and was a member of the choir and the triple trio. She received A ratings in all area music contests, and was named for both all-state and all-Northwest orchestras.

A mezzo soprano, she played the lead in "Annie Get Your Gun," under direction of Dallas Quick. In her senior year of high school, when she studied voice with Quick, she was presented in a joint recital with Mrs. Landra Strother.

In January, 1960, she auditioned in Portland for the Metropolitan Opera Co., for the experience, and later that year was runner-up in the Miss Deschutes County contest. Her interests range from play-reading to basking in the sun, and she takes jazz dance lessons at the Mary Cowden School of Dance.

'62 irrigation to start Sunday on North Unit

MADRAS — The 1962 irrigation season in the North Unit Irrigation district is getting underway earlier this year than last, it was announced this week by Darrell Maxwell, secretary - manager of the district.

Water will be turned into the main canal of the district on Sunday, April 8 heralding the beginning of the irrigation season. Water will reach the south end of the project by Wednesday April 11 and in most of the irrigated area north of Madras on April 12.

First water delivery last year was on April 24 about two weeks later than the current season.

This Sunday will see one of the largest groups of Catholic men ever organized in Bend go out to call upon every member of St. Francis of Assisi parish, Very Reverend Stephen Murtagh, the pastor, announced today.

All parish families have been requested to remain home that afternoon and evening from 3 p.m. until the man assigned to explain the tithing program calls. Because few men have more than four calls to make, the solicitation should be a rapid one.

This program is designed to concentrate all parish contributions in the one Sunday offertory envelope and will eliminate the necessity for all other forms of parish fund raising. All signs, Father Stephen explained, indicate a highly successful conclusion to this program upon which the parish has been laboring for the past six weeks.

Workers in the solicitation will be entertained at a breakfast Sunday morning in the parish hall, following 7:30 mass.

The first report meeting will be held Sunday night at 8 o'clock in the parish hall, and all committee members should attend, general chairman Gottlieb Baer announced.

Restaurant under new management
