There are baseball games and there are marathons, and Thursday's twin bill here with Klamath Falls Pelicans, winning the first game 9-8 and losing the second 8-7.

The first game was highlighted by seven Klamath Falls errors, including four by first sacker Kent Hunsaker. Hunsaker managed another boot in the second

contest to wind up with five for the day.

Anyway, the Klamath Falls defense looked more "vented" than "vaunted" as it came up with a total of 11 errors for the two games.

But Bend had its troubles, too — chiefly in the form of Klamath Falls stolen bases. The Pels swiped six bases in the first game and eight in the second, and benefited from seven Bend errors.

As if this wasn't enough, fans got an extra show when a verbal bout between plate umpire Vince Genna and Klamath Falls baseball coach Bill Mansfield ended in Mansfield's departure prior to the start of the fourth inning in the second contest.

Mansfield left the playing field, but posted himself in the stands, and the feud continued — Genna charging Mansfield with coaching from the stands.

A Klamath Falls baseball manager was tossed out shortly thereafter after being charged with using

ing dirt to rub up the baseball.

Meanwhile, out on the baseball field, Klamath Falls pushed across four runs in the top of the fourth to take a 6-4 lead.

Bend came back with four hits and three runs in the bottom of the sixth to go ahead 7-6.

In the top of the seventh Klamath Falls came back with two more runs to win 8-7. Leadoff batter Paul Noel struck out, but Ken Hunsaker singled, went to second on Jack Pryor's single and then came all the way in when Bend added two errors on the same play.

Pryor was moved to third on the errors, and scored on a wild pitch.

The first game was another "wildy" with Bend jumping off to a 2-1 lead in the first four innings.

But in the top of the fifth Klamath Falls exploded for seven runs on six hits, two errors, five stolen bases and a sacrifice fly.

In the bottom of the fifth Bend bounced back with four runs to trail 8-6, then added three more in the bottom of the sixth to win 9-8.

Bend coach Bill Bauer, saving his mound corps for Saturday's league doubleheaders with The Dalles starting here at 6:30 p.m., used a total of five pitchers in the game.

Gary Haugen, Rich Gunderson, Barry Hebert and Gary McKinney worked three innings each, with Kurt Larson toiling the final two innings.

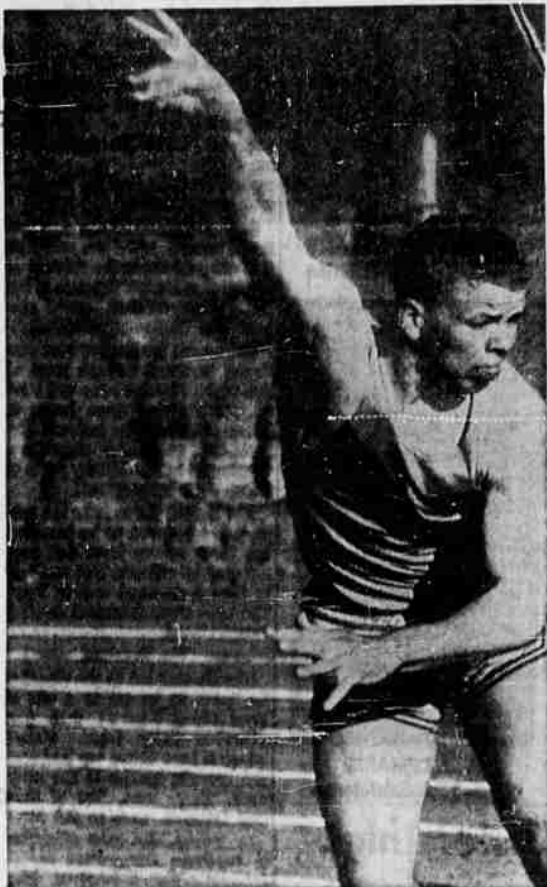
Larson led the Bend hitters in the first game with a double and a single in four trips. Jim Dexter went two for four for Bend in the second game, including a 352-foot double to centerfield.

Sherm Allen, Paul Noel and Larry Smith each had a double and a single in the first game for Klamath, while Hunsaker and Noel went two for four each in the second game.

Bruins ready for relays test

A 24-man Bend High squad will compete in the Hayward Relays Saturday at the University of Oregon oval in Eugene.

Coach Hoot Moore is hoping that his team can wind up first in the A-1 division, which includes schools from 450 to 1000 enrollment.

Bend finished second in this division last year.

Moore expects strongest competition to come from Cottage Grove (last year's A-1 winner), Crater, Thurston and Pendleton — if the latter squad is at full strength.

Some changes have been announced by Moore.

Jerry Rich, Bend ninth grader who clocked a 10.5 100-yard dash Monday, will replace senior Jim Hutchins. Others in this event are Dave Kellogg, Lyle Firkus and anchorman Dave Fletcher, who holds the top mark of 9.9 seconds in the 100-yard dash this season.

In the 300-yard relay Rich will replace Lyle Firkus and is teamed up with Bob Nosler, Hutchins and anchorman Fletcher.

Bend looms strong in the two-mile relay with Herb Hickman, John Cutter, Randy Slate and Rex Chambers.

Hickman, Cutter and Slate will team up in the mile relay again, along with freshman Craig Usher.

In the shuttle hurdles Nosler and Kellogg will team with Bill Hutton.

The distance medley team will feature Dave Snider in the 1320, Usher in the 440, Phil Young in the 880 and Mark Miller in the mile.

Chambers, Lloyd Grant and Hutton will team up in the high jump relays, with Usher, Grant and Kellogg entered in the broad jump relay.

Shot put relay team will include Jim Leagjeld (also entered in the javelin), Mike Hillis and Lee Cottingham.

Cottingham and Allison will also compete in the discus (an individual event), with Bill Tye in the pole vault and Hutton racing in the individual high hurdles.
