### Knuckler fools 'em

## Wilhelm still tossing 'butterfly pitch'

Loft Wilhelm can't make the baseball invisible but his Baltimore Oriole teammates are convinced that the knuckleball he throws is the next best thing.

"It takes practically no effort to throw it," says the 38-year-old native of Huntersville, N.C. "All the effort is in hitting it."

"The easiest thing is to just stand there and look at it," say the batters. "At any moment it would develop into a wild pitch."

Jokes aside, the fact is that the veteran reliever is baffling all hitters with a butterfly pitch that batters would be lucky to catch in a net. He's been the "saver" in the last two Baltimore victories and in his 11th major league season is still recognized as the No. 1 "desperate situation" reliever in baseball.

**Chokes Nat Uprising**

Wilhelm demonstrated his uncanny ability to pitch out of a jam again Friday night when he choked off a ninth-inning rally to preserve the Orioles' 5-4 victory over the Washington Senators.

Wilhelm entered with the Orioles leading, 5-3, in the ninth inning and the bases filled. He threw a comeback potential double play ball to Chuck Hinton only to have catcher Gus Triandos force it wide. Then he took matters into his own hands by striking out Danny O'Connell to end the game.

The implacable right-hander had turned in an equally sensational performance Wednesday night, pitching through the heart of the Yankee batting order with the bases filled to save a 1-0 win for Milt Pappas.

Jim Gentile led the Orioles' 10-hit attack with three hits, including one in the eighth inning when Baltimore scored two runs to take a 5-3 lead. Dick Hall received credit for the victory while Marty Kutyna suffered the loss for the Senators.

**Walker Wins Second**

Jerry Walker went seven innings to pick up his second straight win of the season as the Kansas City A's beat the Chicago White Sox, 7-4. Danny McDevitt finished for the A's, whose 12-hit attack was led by Jerry Lumpe's homer and single driving in four runs. Juan Pizarro, who was tagged for five runs in 4 1-3 innings, was dealt his first defeat after two triumphs.

Bob Allison's double and Earl

Batley's single produced the margin of victory as the Minnesota Twins beat the Los Angeles Angels, 9-7, in 10 innings. Earlier home runs by Harmon Killebrew and rookie Bernie Allen staked the Twins to a 7-5 lead after three innings but the Angels tied the score in the seventh. Dick Stigman, the fourth Minnesota pitcher, was the winner, while Art Fowler, the fourth of five Los Angeles pitchers, was the loser.

There were no other games scheduled.

## Roads to fishing areas said good

Recent warm and sunny weather has melted much of the snow on the lower elevations of the Deschutes National Forest, U.S. Forest Service officials said today.

And although a heavy blanket of snow covers the higher elevations, fishermen should find many of the roads to good fishing areas open for the first day of the season.

Here is the rundown on the Bend district:

All campgrounds along Deschutes River open and snow-free except for few isolated drifts. Roads on east side of Deschutes River open and only few soft spots remain. With exception of campground access roads, roads on west side of river mostly closed.

Main roads to Wickup Reservoir in good shape and north campground and boat launching site almost entirely snow free.

Crane Prairie road is open on north and east sides, and campground partially free of snow.

Three Trappers Road which leads to Cultus Lake plowed open one-lane with no turnouts. Only four-wheel drive vehicles are recommended and campers should not bring trailers. Roads leading to higher elevations on district are all snowed in.

In Crescent district, the Crescent Lake resort and Odell Lake resort are open and ready to accommodate fishermen. Road around Crescent Lake and campgrounds on lake closed due to snow. Sunset Cove campground at Odell Lake is open.

## 3-way track meet won by Prineville

PRINEVILLE — The Prineville Cowboys edged Lakeview 75 1/2 to 65 in a three-day meet here Friday. John Day finished third with 10 1/2 points.

There were a number of outstanding efforts, despite a cold spring day.

One of the best was a 21-foot 2-inch broad jump by Lakeview's Charles Cossey, best broad jump in Central Oregon this season.

Brian Kincaid, non-letterman Prineville senior, got a career-best shot put of 47 feet, and Amacker of Lakeview went 11 feet in the pole vault.

The Prineville cause was helped considerably when junior Jack Bishop won the mile run in 4:59.9 and doubled back to win the 800 in 2:11.2.

were Bill Quant in the high jump, sophomore Martin Boyesen in the high hurdles, sophomore Russell Shroyer in the 440 and Jerry Bernard in the low hurdles.
