

# Titov assures UN there's room for everybody in outer space

NEW YORK (UPI)—Soviet cosmonaut Gherman Titov, 27, assured the United Nations Monday there is enough room in outer space for everybody.

Titov was honor guest at a reception given by Acting Secretary General Thant and attended by members of the U.N. Committee on Outer Space and delegates to the Security Council.

He toasted Thant in champagne, gave the Burmese diplomat a book of Soviet space exploits, autographed by him and Yuri Gagarin, the first man in space, and exchanged quips with U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson.

Stevenson welcomed Titov at Thant's reception "on behalf of and to my country." He remarked that the Russian would have much to discuss with Lt. Col. John Glenn when they meet in Washington at a session of the Committee on Space Research of the International Council of Scientific Unions for which the Russian made the trip from Moscow.

Stevenson jokingly asked Titov if it would be possible to transport the U.N. Security Council to the moon.

"It may not be too difficult to arrange in the future," Titov replied. "But first, why don't you settle the problems on earth."

Titov left the reception in Thant's 38th floor offices for a brief tour of U.N. Headquarters. He entered the Economic and Social Council Chamber, crowded with newsmen and visitors, to loud applause which he returned in the Soviet fashion.

In brief remarks in Russian, he said his 17-orbit flight into space last August was "successfully fulfilled with no mistake or defect."

"Outer space is an enormous area, but there is enough there for everybody. Our delegation will work with COSBAR and will introduce some clarity, perhaps to bring our countries together and perhaps to bring all countries together in the exploration of outer space."

Titov, who achieved international fame last summer when he orbited the globe 17 times, arrived here Sunday night.

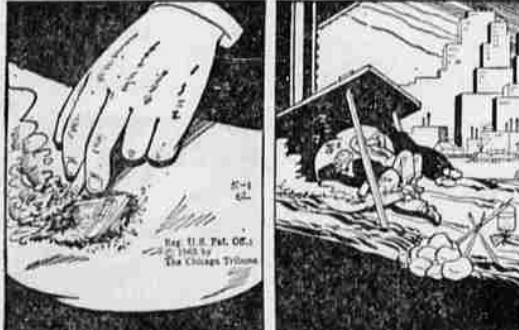
He said he expected to have a chance to meet Glenn during the space symposium which begins Wednesday. Then, smiling broadly, he added "We will have quite a lot to talk about."

## Eichmann gets visit from wife

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) — Adolf Eichmann's wife, Vera, visited him in his jail cell where he is awaiting execution for the murder of six million Jews and left still convinced of his innocence, authorities disclosed today.

"Auf wiedersehen," she said to Eichmann at the end of their meeting in Ramle Prison Sunday night. "When will you be coming home?"

His reply was unknown, officials said.

The former Nazi officer is awaiting a supreme court decision on his appeal from the death sentence. No date has been set for handing down the decision.

Mrs. Eichmann saw her husband after arriving at Lydda Airport from Zurich. Their meeting was the first since he was seized in Argentina and hustled off to Israel for trial two years ago.

## U.S. working to reach Black Muslims to face charges

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Twenty-two members of the extremist Black Muslim cult were to be arraigned Wednesday on charges stemming from a blazing gun battle with police last weekend in which one man was killed and 13 injured.

Seven police officers were injured, one by gunfire, and six members of the cult were shot. Four of the six were critically wounded. Dead was Robert Stokes, 28, Los Angeles, identified by police as one of the black-suited cultists.

About 50 Muslims, all Negroes, and an equal number of police were involved in the street battle by the time it reached a climax shortly after midnight Saturday morning.

Most of the 22 Muslims arrested were booked on charges of assault with intent to commit murder. The battle erupted after two policemen stopped to question two men involved in selling suits near the local headquarters of the Muslim group. Patrolman Frank Tomlinson said one of the men became belligerent and bystanders joined the altercation which followed.

By the time police restored order after the one-hour battle, a crowd of nearly 200 spectators had gathered.

Tomlinson and two other police officers were hospitalized and were reported in satisfactory condition today. The other four policemen were treated and released.

## Minor fire hits UO dormitory

EUGENE (UPI)—Damage was estimated at \$4,000 Monday from a fire which caused evacuation of a woman's dormitory on the University of Oregon campus and burned some coed's formal dresses.

The blaze was discovered about 5:20 p.m. The 97 coeds in Hendricks Hall were evacuated safely in less than two minutes.

The blaze was confined mainly to the closet where the formal dresses were kept.

The rest of the wing of the building in which the closet was located was damaged by smoke and water.

Two firemen, Capt. Dick Small and Ronald Coleman, suffered minor burns.

Cause of the fire was not immediately determined.

## Blast is blamed on escaping gas

PORTLAND (UPI)—Escaping gas was blamed today for an explosion and fire that demolished a home and seriously burned an elderly Japanese couple here Saturday night.

Hospitalized were Harry Uye-sugi, 83, and his wife, Chiyko, 80. The explosion blew out one wall of the 2½ story frame home. Damage from the blast and fire was set at \$12,000.

A fire investigator said a length of pipe sticking out into a basement fruit closet had been removed, opening up a stopped-off gas pipe and letting gas seep through the house. He said the pipe probably was opened up unwittingly, since gas had not been used in the house for many years.
