

Little Stu Miller pitches Giants out of jam

The San Francisco Giants' rivals may have forgotten about soft-spoken, soft-throwing Stu Miller, but manager Alvin Dark hasn't.

Miller, the little relief ace who had a 14-5 record and 2.66 earned run average last season, hadn't worked for the Giants since May 5. Part of the reason was the nine-inning route-going ability of San Francisco pitchers and part was the surprising early relief work of Don Larsen.

Miller was ready Tuesday night

however, when lefty Bill Pierce filtered in the eighth inning of a 6-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals that kept the Giants' early National League lead at four games.

Miller replaced Pierce after Doug Clemens and Ken Boyer singled to open the eighth and threatened the Giants 6-2 lead. The little curveballer yielded a run-scoring single by Gene Oliver but pitched out of the jam by retiring Julian Javier with the bases filled.

The win was the fifth straight for Pierce, who needs only six

more victories to reach the 200 mark for his career. The Giants backed him with an eight-hit attack and handed Curt Simmons his first defeat after five straight triumphs.

The Cincinnati Reds shared the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2, the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Milwaukee Braves, 5-4, the Los Angeles Dodgers outslugged the Houston Mets, 10-7, and the New York Colts beat the Chicago Cubs, 6-5, in a four-hour and 54-minute 13-inning contest.

In the American League, the

Minnesota Twins topped the Detroit Tigers, 4-2, the Boston Red Sox routed the New York Yankees, 14-4, the Kansas City A's downed the Cleveland Indians, 6-5, the Chicago White Sox beat the Washington Senators, 4-3, and the Baltimore Orioles scored a 7-1 victory over the Los Angeles Angels.

Vada Pinson's 12th homer paved the way for Joey Jay to win his fifth decision with late-inning relief help from Bill Henry, Dave Sisler and Ted Williams.

The Dodgers scored six runs on

six hits and a walk with two out in the seventh inning to present relief pitcher Larry Sherry with his second triumph.

Smoky Burgess' 10th-inning single scored Dick Groat with the decisive run for the Pirates, who snuffed a six-game losing streak. Rookie Denis Menke accounted for all the Braves' runs with a grand slam homer.

Rookie Cal Koonce walked Hobbie Landrith with the bases filled and two out in the 13th inning to force in the Mets' winning run and end an ordeal of frustration in which 37 players saw action.

The Mets left 19 runners on base and the Cubs wasted two homers by George Altman and solo homers by Ernie Banks and Billy Williams.

Minoso can't remember accident

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Minnie Minoso, recuperating from a skull fracture and a broken wrist suffered in a May 11 baseball game, revealed that he could not remember his accident when news photographers were permitted in his room Tuesday.

The Cardinal outfielder, who doctors said was not yet out of danger, moved slowly with his eyes closed most of the time while the photographers were present.

Dr. J. C. Middleman, Cardinal team physician, reported that the 39-year-old athlete has shown steady improvement since his injury, suffered while chasing a line drive.

Minoso said he couldn't recall hitting the wall. "I don't remember anything about it," Minoso said. "I saw the ball when it was hit and I knew I was very close to the wall. But I don't remember after that."

Dr. Middleman said Minoso is allowed to get out of bed for short periods now and to dangle his legs over the side of the bed.

He will be out of the Cardinals lineup for at least six weeks and the Redbirds have asked for permission to put him on the disabled list.

Burleson set to race Snell

EUGENE (UPI)—Dyrol Burleson, the American mile record holder, today accepted an invitation to compete in Los Angeles Friday against world record holder Peter Snell of New Zealand.

Burleson, who anchored the Oregon mile relay team to a world record last week at Fresno, will return here Saturday to compete in the 530 yard run in the Far West Relays.

Burleson's American record is 3:57.6. Snell's world record is 3:54.4. They will compete in the Coliseum Relays.

Last Saturday at Fresno Burleson ran a 3:57.7 as the four Oregon milers cracked New Zealand's four mile relay record with a time of 16:08.9. Burleson's time was corrected from an earlier announced 3:57.9.

Snell, who arrived in Los Angeles Tuesday night, predicted Burleson could run a 3:50 mile "if he works hard enough..." He said Burleson was the most serious threat to his world mark.

Lucas expected to sign pact with Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Three-time All-American Jerry Lucas is expected to sign a two-year contract today with the Cleveland Pipers of the American Basketball League.

Details of the pact were scheduled to be disclosed at a press conference called by the Pipers. Lucas, who arrived here late Tuesday night, met with a close friend, Joe Hardy, and Pipers President George Steinbrenner.

Lucas indicated the proposed contract called for a salary of about \$10,000 a season, plus investments worth about \$40,000.

He added that he decided to sign with the Pipers partially because he would be able to complete two quarters of work at Ohio State and get his degree before the start of the ABL's 1962-63 season.

The fact that the ABL plays fewer games than the National Basketball League also was a factor, Lucas said.

Lucas' decision to sign with the Pipers was disclosed Tuesday in a copyrighted article in Sports Illustrated magazine.

The article, written by Lucas, detailed his reasons for rejecting a pro career until now. "The Pipers had carefully studied my objections to professional basketball and came prepared with answers," he wrote.

Meanwhile officials of the Cincinnati Royals of the NBA expressed surprise at Lucas' disclosure.

Executive Vice President Thomas Grayson and coach Charles Wolf, who played golf with Lucas Tuesday, said he told them he would make a decision within the next 10 days.
