

# Pendleton 'Thorne' in side of Bend

**THE DALLES** — Pendleton replaced Bend as the district track champion here Saturday, the Bucks scoring 134 points to runner-up Bend's 83 1-3.

And the issue was never in doubt as Pendleton went one-two in the first event, the 120-yard high hurdles, and continued to pour it on the rest of the day.

You might almost say the meet was won by the Thornes — for Pendleton had three of them going (cousins) and all had a big hand in the victory.

**Bob Thorne Top Scorer**

Sprinter Bob Thorne was the big point getter, winning the 100-yard dash and the broad jump, finishing second in the 220 and running on the winning Pendleton 880-yard relay team for a total of 30 1/2 points.

Curt Thorne won both hurdle events and was on the relay team to score 22 1/2 points.

Dave Thorne was second in both hurdle events and on the relay team for 18 1/2 points. Between them, the Thornes accounted for

7 1/2 points — more than half of Pendleton's points and almost as many as third place Hermiston.

Pendleton also won the pole vault, Chuck Blackley going 12-6; the 440, Dave Walker running :51.5; and tied for first in the high jump, Ray Hughes going 5-10.

**Five Tie in High Jump**

Five tied for first in the high jump, but Hughes and Bend's Rex Chambers had fewer number of misses to gain the spots to the A-1 track meet at Corvallis this Friday and Saturday. First two finishers in each event go to the state meet.

Of the 34 spots awarded the Intermountain Conference in the state meet, Pendleton qualified eight men in 16 events and Bend qualified six men in six events to account for 22 positions.

La Grande qualified four men in three events (including the second-place relay team) to gain five spots; Ontario qualified two men in two spots; Baker qualified one man in one spot; Hermiston qualified two men in two spots and Redmond qualified one man in one spot.

The Dalles and Prineville failed to land a man in the state meet. Had Bend's Dave Fletcher been able to qualify in the sprints, the meet could have been a lot closer. Fletcher, injured three weeks ago, could conceivably have won both the 100 and 220 in top shape. But even wins there wouldn't have been enough to halt Pendle-

ton Saturday.

And he would have had his work cut out for him in the 100 where Bob Thorne was timed in a wind-aided 9.85 seconds.

As it was, Fletcher made it to the state meet in the 440 where he chased Pendleton's Walker to an Intermountain Conference mark of :51.5. Fletcher also broke the old IC standing of :52.2 with a :51.8 clocking.

Bend's Herb Hickman and John Cutler, running one-two in the 880, both came in with new records — clobbering the old mark of 2:04 set by Hickman as a freshman last year.

Saturday, running part of the time against a strong wind, Hickman was timed in 2:00.5, with Cutler coming home in 2:01.6.

Hickman's time broke the Bend school record of 2:00.9 set by Willard Nelson way back in 1937.

**Bennion Sets Mile Mark**

In the mile run Hermiston's Ralph Bennion clipped more than four seconds off the IC record with a 4:35.7 clocking. The first four finishers all broke the old mark of 4:39.8, including fourth-place Randy Slate of Bend who had a 4:39.7 — his best performance to date and a fine race.

Other IC records included Curt Thorne's :14.8 time in the high hurdles, Bob Thorne's 21-3/4 broad jump effort, Blackley's 12-6 pole vault and Pendleton's 1:32.5 time in the 880-yard relay.

Gaining Central Oregon's other spots were Bend's Jim Leagfeld,

who won the javelin with a 179-9 throw against the wind; Lee Cottingham, second in the shot put with a 48-10 1/4 throw; and Redmond's Jim Raske, second in the discus with a 151-1 1/2 effort.

### Retreads make good

# 'Castoffs' cause plenty red faces

It's beginning to look like the "year of the castoff" in the major leagues.

In baseball parlance, the "cast-off" is a reject, a retread or simply a guy for whom a club no longer has any use.

This year a whole contingent of players started off with the "cast-off" label—guys like Chuck Essegian of the Indians, Bo Belinsky of the Angels, Billy Pierce of the Giants and Frank Thomas of the Mets, to name a few. Given a chance to make good with new teams, 1962's "castoffs" are causing a lot of red faces in many front offices.

Essegian, turned down by five other major league clubs, had four hits in eight at-bats, including two home runs that helped the Indians set an American League record, split a doubleheader with the Detroit Tigers and remain in a first-place tie with the New York Yankees.

**Set Homer Mark**

His two homers and six others gave the Indians a total of 25 for eight games, breaking the old AL record of 22 set by the Yankees last year. Cleveland won the opener, 7-6, but lost the nightcap, 8-6. Bubba Phillips' ninth-inning single broke up the first game, while Jim Bunning's three-inning relief stint helped the Tigers gain the split in the second game.

The two homers gave Essegian 10 for the season in only 23 games and helped boost his batting average to .385—tops in the AL. Al Kaline hit two homers for the Tigers in the nightcap to take over the AL lead with 12.

The Yankees, meanwhile, downed the Minnesota Twins, 4-3, but lost, 4-2, in the 13-inning second game; the Los Angeles Angels swept the Boston Red Sox, 5-3 and 1-0; the Chicago White Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles twice, by 8-3 scores, and the Kansas City Athletics nipped the Washington Senators, 1-0, and then lost, 7-5.

**Mets Win Two**

In the National League, the New York Mets beat the Milwaukee Braves, 7-6 and 9-6; the San Francisco Giants widened their lead to 4 1/2 games by bouncing

back to beat the Houston Colts, 7-4, after dropping a 6-5 decision; the Chicago Cubs swept the Philadelphia Phillies, 6-4 and 11-2; the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Cincinnati Reds, 8-2, and the St. Louis Cardinals edged Los Angeles, 4-3, to take over second place by 1 1/2 percentage points.

Belinsky, dropped by the Orioles because they didn't think he could make the major league grade, gave up a bunt single to Pete Runnels in the first inning and a double to Bob Tillman in the fourth inning of the nightcap. Two weeks ago the talkative Belinsky pitched a no-hit, no run game against Baltimore. Sunday's win was his sixth against one loss. The Angels overcame a pair of home runs by Carroll Hardy to win the opener, with Bob Rodgers driving in the winning run in the fifth on a sacrifice fly.

A double and three straight singles in the top of the 13th off reliever Jim Coates broke up the Minnesota-New York nightcap and enabled Ray Moore to pitch a split for the day. Moore pitched to four batters in the ninth inning of the first game and didn't get anyone out, Tom Tresh's single with the bases full deciding the issue. Homer Maris hit his seventh homer in the first game and Harmon Killebrew his eighth. The split left the Twins 1/2 game behind New York and Cleveland.

The White Sox took the opener with a 14-hit barrage, including two homers by Al Smith as Johnny Buzhardt, a reject from the Phillies, gained his fifth victory against two losses. Smith added two more hits and two more RBIs in the nightcap to help Ray Herbert gain his fourth win in five decisions.
