

No word on new tests

HONOLULU (UPI)—There was no official word from U.S. Joint Task Force 8 today on further plans to explode a rocket-borne nuclear device over Johnston Island, where two previous attempts ended in failure.

However, informed sources said it would be at least 10 days before another shot of any type could be scheduled after the failure Tuesday night. The Thor rocket and its nuclear warhead were destroyed two minutes after launching in a near repetition of the first attempt June 3.

There have been 21 announced explosions during the Pacific test series which began three months ago, but all of them were conducted at Christmas Island.

The Johnston Island phase of the operation called for three or four rocket-borne nuclear tests.

The first attempt was to have been a relatively small device exploded at an altitude of 30 miles, while Tuesday night's futile effort—a megaton device equal to a million or more tons of TNT—was scheduled for an altitude of from 200 to 500 miles.

The third attempt in the original plans called for a blast about 200 miles above the earth, and the possible fourth was contingent upon the outcome of the first three.

U.S. flier with Luftwaffe killed

BONN (UPI) — The death of a U.S. pilot flying for the Luftwaffe pointed up the meshing of the new West German air force with that of the United States.

The American pilot and three German military fliers were killed Tuesday when the four American designed but German-built Super Starfighter jets they were flying in close formation collided and fell to the earth near Cologne.

The American was identified as Capt. John G. Speer, 29, whose mother, Mrs. Sally M. Bowers, lives at Glendale, Calif. He also is survived by his wife, Joann, and three children.

Speer, an instructor with the German air force for about two years, was honored by the Luftwaffe about two months ago for safely landing a Super Starfighter trainer after its radar and other flight control equipment had been put out of action by lightning.

The American captain was the first U.S. officer to die in a plane bearing the iron cross. The crash was the worst the seven year Luftwaffe has suffered.

The four probably were convers-

ing with each other in English during their fatal flight, because English is now the command language of the Luftwaffe.

Many of the pilots in the eight squadrons that have been activated and assigned to NATO were trained in the United States or Canada. Those trained here were instructed by Germans who had learned their business in North America.

IWA continues strike session

PORTLAND (UPI)—Officials of the International Woodworkers of America continued to meet today to discuss possible strike action against lumber employers.

The union, as well as the Lumber and Sawmill Workers, has asked a 30-cent hourly pay increase. Employers have said they cannot afford it.

The contracts opened this year for wages only. IWA's region three has nearly 30,000 members.

Bobby's spouse falls into pool at dinner dance

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Mrs. Robert F. Kennedy, wife of the attorney general, fell into the family pool during an outdoor dinner dance Saturday night, it was learned Wednesday.

So did a couple of guests. Special Presidential Assistant Arthur Schlesinger and Mrs. Spencer Davis, a close friend of Mrs. Kennedy.

A source close to the family said Mrs. Kennedy, in full evening attire, plunged into the water after a leg of her chair slipped off a plank placed across the pool's edges. The same thing happened later to Schlesinger and Mrs. Davis. All three changed clothes and returned to the party.

But another guest, astronaut John Glenn, managed to keep his chair upright although its legs were but three inches from the edge of the plank.

The seating arrangement was necessary because with 363 guests, there barely was room in the yard of the McLean, Va., estate to situate all the tables and chairs.

"Actually, it was a very quiet party," the source said.

Group to seek higher prices for fishermen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A labor union has set up a lobbying and educational organization to try to help fishermen get higher prices for their catch.

The National Conference of Fishermen and Fish Cannery workers was set up by the Seafarer's Union and its 16 locals with membership in the industry.

Lester Ballinger of San Diego, secretary-treasurer of the union's cannery workers and fishermen's Pacific Coast division, was named national coordinator of the new group.

A spokesman said it would attempt to remove a provision of antitrust law that bars fishermen's unions from bargaining on prices of fish before they sail on a trip.

The new group, which includes some 18,000 workers in "its affiliated locals, also hopes to increase organizing in Maine, Newfoundland, Florida, and along the Gulf Coast. Its potential membership is about 55,000, the spokesman said.

"Somebody's making this up," she said when she heard the reports that she had had trouble getting the visa.

"It's not true. There's been no delay in the visa. In fact, I got it this morning without even submitting the required passport pictures. Everybody's been very nice."

Miss MacLaine said she would fly to Prague Friday and then go to the Carlsbad Film Festival, to which she has been invited.

The reports of her visa trouble followed an earlier report that she had threatened to dance the can-can naked in Kremlin Square, and that her luggage was stolen. She denied both these reports, too.

A spokesman said petitions from locals charged that Silvers has been meeting secretly with Teamsters officials in an attempt to lead the 18,000-member CWA unit into the Teamsters Union.

Building permit increase noted

Building permits increased in Bend in May, 1962, compared to May, 1961, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research has reported.

In May, 1962, the total was \$132,700, compared to \$72,645 in total reporting centers in Oregon the same month last year.

Building permits from 147 identical reporting centers in Oregon totaled \$24,676,709 in May 1962. This was .22 per cent lower than in May 1961.

The state total in May, 1962, included \$11,550,806 for 1012 new dwelling units; \$9,599,878 for non-residential construction; and \$3,526,025 for additions, alterations, and repairs of existing structures.

Thursday, June 28, they will be shown through Gourmet Food Products, Inc., in Culver, visit the lookout site over Round Butte Dam, return to Suttle Lake for lunch, and from thence home.

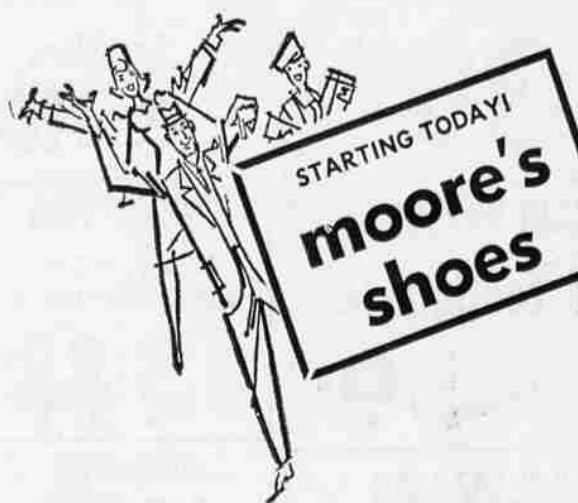
REQUESTS TAX CUT

WASHINGTON (UPI) — AFL-CIO President George Meany has urged President Kennedy to ask Congress for an immediate tax cut, which would be concentrated in the low income bracket.

Meany said a reduction in income taxes was "vital to essential to avoid slowing the rate of economic growth." His proposal came in the form of a memorandum to Kennedy that was made public on Wednesday.

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
