Leaders plan strategy meets

OTTAWA (UPI) — Prime Minister John Diefenbaker and his conservative cabinet met Wednesday to decide how their minority government will operate in Canada's 25th Parliament and avert another election in six months.

A post-mortem on how the conservatives' 203-seat majority in the House of Commons was reduced in Monday's election to a 118-seat minority also was a certainty.

Lester B. Pearson, leader of a resurgent liberal party which will hold at least 99 seats when Parliament convenes in September, also scheduled a major strategy session Wednesday.

Diefenbaker returned to the capital Tuesday night from his home riding (district) of Prince Albert, Sask. Questioned by newsmen when his plane made a refueling stop in Winnipeg, Man., the prime minister declared:

"The government has no coalition at the present time and it is still in office."

Most observers felt the best chance of avoiding another election within six months appeared to lie with some form of coalition between the conservatives and the Social Credit party (SOCRED), which surprised the nation by winning 30 seats. Twenty-six of these were in Quebec Province.
