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## End talk of runaway

# Giants take three-game sweep from Dodgers

It's a new race in the National League but the same old story in the American League.

The San Francisco Giants completed a three-game sweep of the NL's biggest series of the season with Sunday's 5-1 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers. That cut the Giants' deficit to 2½ games, ended talk of a Dodger runaway and probably means a sizzling pennant fight to the end.

Here's a capsule outlook for both races: The Giants, with 44 games left, have one more game

to play than the Dodgers and trail by only two games in the lost column.

The New York Yankees, meanwhile, opened up a 5½-game lead in the AL with their 2-0 triumph over the Detroit Tigers and already the figure liberts are computing that a .500 pace for the rest of the season would give the Yankees their second straight pennant under Ralph Houk.

Here's a capsule outlook for both races: The Yankees, with 44 games left, have one more game

to play than the Dodgers and trail by only two games in the lost column.

The Yankees would wind up with 94 victories if they won only 24 of their remaining 48 games—and that would mean the second-place Los Angeles Angels would have to play .600 ball to win.

Juan Marichal, 24-year-old right hander, pitched a four-hitter to win his 15th game of the season. Jose Pagan drove in three runs

for the Giants.

Run-scoring singles by Roger Maris and Elston Howard produced both Yankee runs in the eighth inning before 42,996 at New York. Bill Stafford pitched a five-hitter to win his 10th game for the Yankees while Ron Kline suffered his fourth setback for Detroit.

The Cincinnati Reds whipped the New York Mets, 8-4; the Pittsburgh Pirates beat the Chicago

Cubs, 5-4; the Houston Colts defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 6-5; and the Philadelphia Phillies swept the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-3 and 9-7, in other NL games.

In the other AL action, the Minnesota Twins topped the Angels, 5-3; the Chicago White Sox shamed the Kansas City Athletics, 1-0; the Boston Red Sox downed the Baltimore Orioles, 4-1 and the Cleveland Indians rallied for a 5-3 triumph over the Washington

Senators.

## Jay Wins 18th

Joey Jay won his 18th game for the Reds behind an eight-hit attack that included homers by Gordon Coleman, Leo Cardenas and Wally Post. Jay was belted for a three-run homer by Charley Neal in the first inning.

Bob Skinner drove in three runs with two homers and a single to lead the Pirates' 12-hit, "nack on four Cub pitchers. Relief pitcher Jack Lamabe picked up his second win for the Pirates while Don Elston was tagged with his seventh defeat. George Altman homered for the Cubs.

The Colts ended a seven-game losing streak but had to throw both Don McMahon and Russ Kemmerer into the game before halting a two-run Milwaukee rally in the ninth.

Cal McLish pitched a seven-hitter to raise his record to 8-2 in the first game and the Phillies completed the sweep by outslugging the Cardinals in the nightcap. Johnny Callison hit a two-run triple to highlight a game-winning three-run rally in the sixth inning of the first game and blasted a three-run homer in the eighth inning of the nightcap.

## Errors Help Twins

Errors by Leon Wagner and pitcher Ryno Duren helped the Twins score two unearned runs in the seventh inning. Dick Stigman yielded a three-run eighth-inning homer to Felix Torres but went the route to win his seventh game.

Jim Landis' eighth-inning homer produced the only run of a pitching duel between the White Sox and Ray Herbert and Kansas City's Bill Fischer. The Athletics threatened in the eighth inning but Juan Pizarro struck out Jerry Lampe to end the threat.

Eddie Bressoud's three-run homer was all that Earl Wilson needed to notch his ninth decision for the Red Sox. Wilson walked four and struck out nine in handling Milt Pappas his eighth defeat.

Gene Green's pair of two-run homers enabled the Indians to come from behind and give Jim Grant his 12th straight win in the Senators' home park. Grant hasn't been beaten at Washington in five years and has a 20-4 lifetime record against the Senators.

## Loyal subjects roar as Hurryin' Hugh sparks TD

SEATTLE (UPI) — The "king" came back to Seattle Saturday and 22,500 of his loyal subjects roared approval.

At 33, Hugh McElhenny is a mile older and a step slower than in the days when his flashing feet carved out a chunk of football history at the University of Washington.

Pro football has largely passed him by. Backs are faster now, the pace is man-killing and the former All-American is headed down the home stretch of a long professional career.

Still, nobody got a bigger hand than McElhenny when the public address announcer called the roll as the Minnesota Vikings and the San Francisco Forty Niners of the National Football League matched muscle, might and manpower in preseason play here.

### Show of Courage

San Francisco won it 30-24 when Bill Kilmer and Jim Johnson collaborated on a 92-yard touchdown pass play.

Afterwards, in the dressing room, McElhenny punched a fist over and over into his palm.

"I wish we could have won it; I wish we could have won it... damn it!"

Nobody in the stands minded too much.

He gave them in the third quarter what they came to see—a display of raw courage into which he poured all of his vast talents.

San Francisco had gained a 20-14 halftime lead when Tommy Davis drilled a pair of field goals just before the half ended. Then the "king" returned.

### Leads Drive

He stepped for 3, added 10 more and still another 10. A screen pass to McElhenny was good for 11.

A Viking pass play fizzled then and Fran Tarkenton, a sophomore quarterback, was hopelessly trapped. Tarkenton shoved McElhenny a pass that traveled all of 18 inches and off he stormed for 12 more yards to the Forty Niner five.

The next play came as a surprise—at least to the Forty Niners. Mel Triplett, another gent who has been in the program a long time, scored standing up around right end.

Sprawled on the grass after a withering block that wiped out a Forty Niner defender was McElhenny.

They had given him a plaque at halftime and Hugh smiled and waved up to the stands.

It was a fair trade. He gave quite a bit of himself.

## Son watches dad die in race

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (UPI) — Rookie race driver Jackson Hagemeyer of Indianapolis, Ind., was killed in qualifications at a sprint car race here Sunday as his 9-year-old son looked on, unaware he had just seen his father die.

Hagemeyer was killed when he lost control of the car on the first turn on the dirt track at the Vigo County Fairgrounds.

Witnesses said his car skidded across the track after hitting a rut, and then leaped into the air where it rolled over several times before hitting the ground upside down.

The 28-year-old driver was apparently killed instantly. He was dead on arrival at St. Anthony's Hospital in Terre Haute.

Hagemeyer was the second driver to die of injuries in a crash at the track this season. Stan Bowman of Covington, Ky., died last June after an accident here.

### GREGORY TAKES RACE

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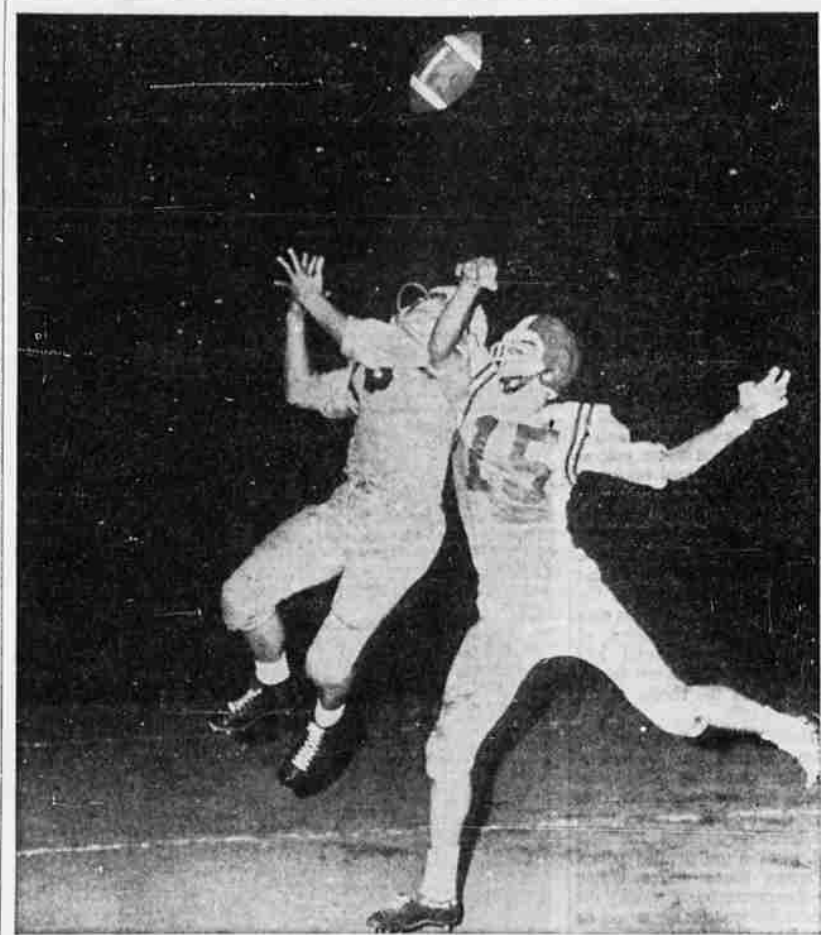

The Southern Oregon team wrapped up a best-of-five game series for the title with a 4-1 win over Tigard for its second straight crown Saturday night.

Roseburg won the series 3-1. Roseburg will represent Oregon in the Western regional tournament at Las Vegas, N.M. It will take on the Nevada representative in the opening round next Saturday.

## Jesuit's Casey difference as Metro beats State 28-7

PORTLAND (UPI) — Jesuit's Tim Casey made a big difference Saturday night.

The 197-pound fullback sparked underdog Metro to a 28-7 victory over State in the 15th annual Shrine all-star football game before 19,471.

Casey scored twice in the second period as the Metros erupted for three touchdowns to overcome a 7-0 first period advantage for State.

The Jesuit griddler tallied on a 32-yard pass interception and on a one-yard plunge.

Casey, who also played an outstanding game at his defensive linebacking position, was voted the most valuable player. He picked up 71 yards in 17 carries.

### "Wonderful Job"

"He did a wonderful job for us," Metropolitan Coach Duke Moore of Beaverton said. "When he intercepted that pass and ran for our third touchdown, it seemed to be the turning point for us. I knew then that we had things under control."

The victory was the fifth in the last six years for the Metros and gave them a 7-6-2 edge in the series.

State Coach Roy Thompson of Roseburg said "they just did a better job than us and that's all there was to it. But we certainly didn't expect to lose like this."

State scored in the first period on a three-yard run by Medford quarterback Scott Eaton. Metro's other touchdowns came in the second period on a 27-yard pass from Jefferson quarterback Brian Barnes to Grant halfback Wes Austin and in the third period on a six-yard run by Sunset halfback Dan Maust.

Barnes and Eaton were named the most valuable backs and the most valuable linemen were guard Kenny King of Roseburg for State and guard Dean Francis-kovich of Madison for the Metros.

Metro enjoyed a big statistical edge of 17-0 in first downs and 319-156 in total yardage.
