Reds rip Dodgers via grand slammer

What a madhouse!
Frank Robinson produced the biggest bedlam in Cincinnati's dressing room Monday night since Sept. 26, 1961.

purposefully passed Vada Pinson to pitch to Robinson.
"I knew it was gone soon as I hit it," Robinson laughed later. "Yeah, we knew it, too. That's why we all tagged up," ribbed Pinson.

Robinson wasn't the only hero even though his homer was his 14th of the month, setting a Cincinnati club record.
Besides Robinson, there was Bob Purkey, who recorded his 19th victory despite homers by Willie and Tommy Davis in the sixth inning.

And there was Gene Freese, playing his first game of the season after breaking his ankle during spring training, who collected two singles, including one that tied the score at 3-3.

Despite the defeat, the Dodgers didn't lose any ground to the second-place San Francisco Giants, who remained 3 1/2 games behind by dropping a 9-4 decision to the Milwaukee Braves.

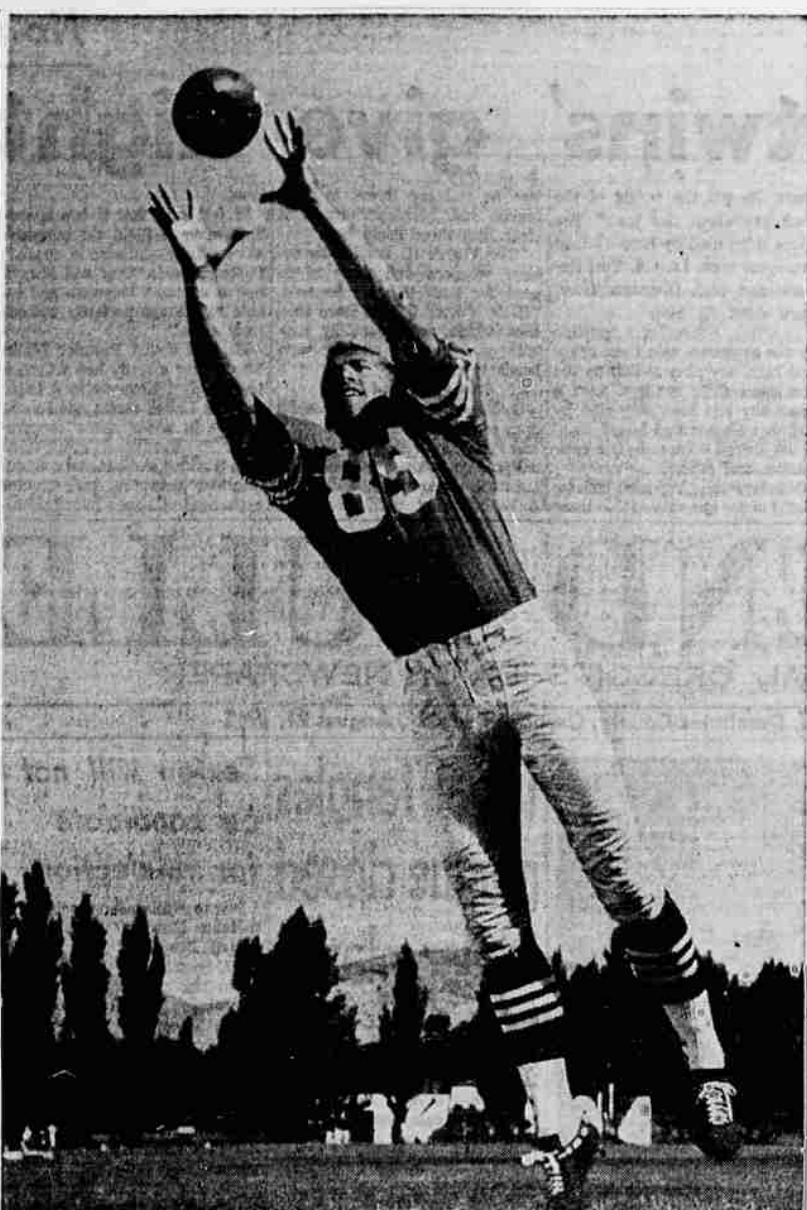
The Pittsburgh Pirates swept a pair from the New York Mets, 2-0 and 6-3, and the Philadelphia Phillies beat the Houston Colts, 7-1. A scheduled second game between the Phils and Colts was rained out.

In the American League, where only two games were scheduled, the Kansas City A's came from behind to defeat the New York Yankees, 7-3, and the Minnesota Twins bumped the Boston Red Sox, 6-4.

Tommy Aaron's two-run homer off loser Don Larsen ignited a five-run seventh inning rally that snapped a 4-4 tie between the Braves and Giants. Warren Spahn won his 13th of the season and the 322nd of his career.

Extend Losing Streak
Pittsburgh's two victories over the Mets stretched the tailenders losing streak to 12 games. Bob Friend won his 14th with a four-hitter in the opener and Al McBean nailed down his 13th in the nightcap although he needed help.

The Phillies' triumph over the Colts marked their 13th straight without a loss to Houston this season and came shortly after manager Gene Mauch was given a new contract for the 1962 season.

Notre Dame great 'Sleepy Jim' likes modern grid game

TACOMA, Wash. (UPI) — Jimmie H. (Sleepy Jim) Crowley of Notre Dame "Four Heavens" fame said his 265 pounds (without any signals) from one side of the head came to the other and said: "Two things in current football that you didn't have in the past were the opportunity to throw the smaller ball of today on a bullet into any place on the field and the popularity of red-dogging by linebackers."

Crowley, captain of the Pennsylvanian State Athletic Commission, was chatting between sessions of the National Bowling Association convention here. "We did plenty of punting during my years at Notre Dame, but through '26," said the slightly plump six-footer with the long, wavy dark brown hair, "but you couldn't punt like that — or in any liver yards as a career — with the larger ball that had to be hit over a high into the air to get any distance — and was therefore risky in reaching the receiver."

Today, he said, punners throw the little ball down the field on almost a straight line and bullet fast — to beat the defense. "And, whenever possible the receiver is in position to turn and catch the ball close to the sideline (the one phrase!) so that if he misses, the ball goes out of bounds immediately."

Concerning the defensive "red dogging," the old-time Notre Dame left halfback said there always had been defensive backfield men who occasionally could smash through the line and break up a play. "But today," he stressed, "every team, particularly the professionals, have linebackers who specialize in red-dogging — jumping through and containing the backfield."

It's particularly interesting, he pointed out, to see who has played and coached. He coached Georgia, Michigan State, Foghorn and North Carolina Pre-Flight School.

75-day duck season set

PORTLAND (UPI) — The State Game Commission Monday gave Oregon waterfowl hunters a 75-day duck and goose season with bag limits identical to last year.

The season was adopted within five days of the start of the duck and goose season was set to open at noon Oct. 20 and extend through Jan. 2. Bag limit for ducks is 10 and 4 for geese. In possession limits on ducks, hunters must allow 5 birds to remain in the daily bag and 4 in possession in the field.

There will be no open season for mallards and canvasbacks during the 75-day season.
