4-power talks on Berlin issue urged by Rusk

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Secretary of State Dean Rusk urged Russia today to agree to four-power talks on ways to reduce tensions touched off by Communist gunfire against refugees fleeing East Berlin.

Rusk advanced the proposal in a 20-minute meeting with Russian Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin, who was summoned to discuss the deteriorating situation in divided Berlin. He called for meetings in U.S., British, French and Soviet military command areas in Berlin to "find ways to reduce tensions in the city."

The move came as Washington officials apparently approved a plan for Western forces in Berlin to provide ambulances for East German refugees who are fired on as they attempt to flee across the Berlin wall.

The ambulances would be authorized to drive into East Berlin territory on mercy missions to pick up victims, such as an 18-year-old East German youth who fell wounded on the East Berlin side of the wall last Friday and was left there to die.

West Berliners, angered by the step, have conducted four days of tense demonstrations which at one point involved some 10,000 persons. They showed both American and Soviet military bases occupying West Berlin.

Officials here said the money ambulance plan was being discussed in Berlin today among Allied commanders who apparently will have the final voice in the matter.

"It is not his best position with the situation as best he can deal with it," Rusk said in a statement.

Rusk's bid for a four-power command meeting paralyzing efforts by the U.S. commandant in Berlin, Maj. Gen. Albert Watson II, to set up such a meeting. The Soviet commandant, Col. V. V. Sigurov, rebuffed the proposal.

The United States proposed talks to find ways to reduce tensions, of reducing incidents of violence along the wall, and of finding the means of reducing tensions and violence.

Rusk said tensions had "escalated to the point where the last few days have manifested the importance of getting together."

Officers are trying to get in touch with a motorist who stopped at the scene of an accident, but gave assistance in a peculiar way.

Work completed on courtroom

PRINEVILLE - Final touches on the renovation of Crook county's time-battered circuit court room were being made Monday by a crew of workmen intent on finishing the job before the opening of a session of circuit court today.

County Judge Ervic Grimes surveyed the busy scene with considerable satisfaction, noting that the lofty ceiling had been lowered 38 inches and ceiled with acoustic tile to improve the audibility of court proceedings.

No longer, he also commented, will a nervous witness clatter across the courtroom to take the stand. The expansive court room has been completely tiled, over a sub-layer of chip-board, making footsteps almost inaudible.

On the top of the judge's bench, scarred and worn by a half-century of judicial ponderings, a milcarta top, rimmed with chrome, has been installed above the time-darkened oak facing of the judge's bench.

Steps from the basement to the third floor of the courthouse have also now been covered with rubber-matting to prevent further erosion, and the eventual need for replacement of the steps, Judge Grimes said.
