Lee Cottingham doubtful starter in Saturday's game at Parkrose

What a difference a day makes. Wednesday, Bend High football coach Tom Winbiger reported his squad in top shape for Saturday's game at Parkrose, starting 2 p.m. daylight time and 1 p.m. Bend time.

Then he scheduled a light dummy practice for Thursday, and the injury list skyrocketed.

The real big question mark is 210-pound fullback Lee Cottingham, who also plays a key role on defense as a tackle.

Cottingham was hitting the sleds Thursday night when he suffered a bad bone bruise on his elbow. X-rays were taken, but no fracture was found.

Still, that elbow is really tender to touch. And, even with a pad on it, Cottingham is a doubtful starter.

If he can't go, his place on the offensive squad will be taken by hard-hitting junior Harold Weatherers.

Fred Hamn, a 218-pounder who broke his nose Thursday, will take his spot on defense.

Also injured last night was reserve right guard Mike Murphy, who got his knee knocked out of joint. And Benny Dexter, who missed the opening game with Center because of a pulled leg muscle, reinjured the leg in gym this week.

If that wasn't enough trouble, quarterback Bobby Warrington has been laid low by a lung infection this week, but Winbiger is hopeful he'll be okay by Saturday.

Quarterbacking the first unit in Warrington's absence last night was junior Jerry Wetle, with Mike Clark in a reserve role.

Despite the injuries, Tom reported that the team is in good spirits and has really been hustling.

They've scheduled a light workout tonight, then leave for Portland about 7:30 Saturday morning.

Sports arena plan approved

SEATTLE (UPI) — A citizens' committee Thursday approved a plan to convert the Washington State Coliseum on the World's Fair grounds into a sports arena to seat 12,000 to 18,000 persons.

The plan was one of four submitted by architect Paul Thiry. The arena would be used for ice hockey, basketball, boxing and political and other conventions.

The proposal was unanimously recommended by a committee of Seattle sports and convention figures.

College football squads ready for openers

It's full steam ahead for most of the country's college football teams Saturday, with defending national champion Alabama heading the list of major powers playing on the first big Saturday of the 1962 season.

Following several weeks of scrimmaging and glowing publicity reports from the training camps, Saturday's the day when youthful vigor and optimism clash head-on with reality. By the time autumn officially sweeps the land Sunday morning most teams should have a better idea of where they're heading.

Alabama, undefeated in 10 regular-season games last year, is a heavy favorite to start the new campaign right against Georgia in a night game. The Crimson Tide, which beat Arkansas in the Sugar Bowl, boasts a solid defensive unit but must overcome the losses of backs Pat Trammell and Mike Fracchia.

Ohio State, ranked second last year, is idle but three other members of the top five open their seasons at home in night contests.

Louisiana State, with 26 of its top 33 men returning from a 9-1 season, gets an early toughie against Texas A&M; Texas, favored to repeat in the Southwest Conference, takes on Oregon; and Mississippi, a leading contender along with Alabama and LSU for the Southeastern Conference title, plays Memphis State.

Another game sure to receive nationwide attention will be played at West Point where Army meets Wake Forest. The Cadets, believed by many to be starting a new dynasty under the leadership of civilian coach Paul Dietzel, are favored by better than two touchdowns to clip the Deacons.

In other leading games, hard-luck Colorado is at Utah for a night affair; rebuilding Oklahoma hosts Syracuse; Washington, the pre-season choice to go to the Rose Bowl, is at home to Purdue; Arkansas meets Oklahoma State at Little Rock; Utah State plays Idaho at Boise; Missouri is at California, and Duke is at Southern California in a nationally televised game.

Fading Giants, Twins fall back

It's all over but the shouting — The shouting that will accompany the first coast-to-coast World Series in baseball history.

It's going to be the Yankees against the Dodgers — because their challengers have run out of gas and very soon now they're also going to run out of games.

It's not mathematically certain yet but it would take an Einstein to figure out a winning combination for the Twins and Giants.

For the record, the Yankees' magic number to clinch the American League pennant is down to four and the Dodgers' pennant-clinching number in the National League has been reduced to six.

The Twins and the Giants cashed in their chips, to all intents and purposes, Thursday when Minnesota was beaten by the Detroit Tigers, 5-1, and San Francisco bowed to the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-4. The Twins now trail the Yankees by 4½ games with seven to play while the Giants trail the Dodgers by four with nine to go.

The Tigers took advantage of an error by Vic Power to score three unearned runs in the first inning and went on to beat the Twins and give Phil Regan his 11th victory. Al Kaline had a homer and two singles to pace the nine-hit attack that dealt 17-game winner Jim Kaat his 14th defeat. Zoilo Versalles homered for the Twins.

The Giants went down in old St. Loo when Ken Boyer's run-scoring single capped a two-run ninth-inning Cardinal rally. The Giants led by 4-1 in the sixth but the Cardinals drew to within one run by scoring two tallies against 22-game winner Jack Sanford in the seventh.
