Accord nears in rail tie-up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Acting Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz met today with union and management officials amid reports a settlement was imminent in the 23-day-old Chicago and North Western Railway strike.

This was the fourth consecutive day both sides had met with Wirtz to work out an agreement on points to submit to an arbitration board.

The new labor secretary was under heavy pressure to speed an agreement. A spokesman for the Labor Department said Wirtz had received approximately 2,000 telegrams from Midwest mayors and other officials and groups urging an end to the walkout by 1,000 telegrams. The strike has crippled transportation in several states.

It was understood that only about three points would be submitted to an arbitration board. The board will be appointed as soon as the two parties agree on wording of the questions involved.

James R. Boyd taken by death

James R. (Jim) Boyd, formerly of Bend, died Thursday morning in Garden Grove, Calif. He and his wife had lived there the past two years, since his retirement from business. He was in partnership in Bend for many years with his brother-in-law, N. H. Coleman, in Oregon Hydro-Gas Co.

He is survived by his widow, Marguerite, and two sons, Jim and Joe, all of Garden Grove, and his sister, Mrs. Coleman, in Bend.

Only one-third of county's dogs receive shots

Only slightly over a third of the licensed dogs in Deschutes county received rabies shots at the clinics in Bend and Redmond, it was pointed out today. There are some 3,000 licensed dogs in the county, according to Jess Smith, dog warden.

Figures from a nether source made the picture brighter, percentage-wise. The 87 per cent figure was arrived at by using 1,200 as the number of licensed dogs.

A clinic will be held next Monday in Prineville, from 4 to 8 p.m. in the courthouse basement. Inoculation of from 80 to 90 per cent of the dog population is recommended to place a community "out of danger" from infection transferred by rabid bats or other means.

Defense course gets underway

A medical self-help course began Thursday evening at the courthouse, under sponsorship of the Deschutes County Civil Defense department. Classes will meet Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 7 to 9 p.m., for one month. Registration is not closed, and persons interested in enrolling may attend the class next Tuesday in Room 210 at the courthouse. Registration may also be made by calling the Civil Defense office, EV 2-3061.

The course covers the following subjects: understanding of radiation, with protective measures; hygiene, sanitation and vermin control; how to care for the injured who need help from bleeding, fractured limbs or by artificial respiration, and infant and child care and emergency childbirth.

The skills taught in the class are to be applied under emergency conditions only, assuming that a doctor or nurse may not be available for a relatively long period of time.

"Without such knowledge, many lives could be needlessly lost," said William C. James, Civil Defense director. "But with proper knowledge, on the other hand, citizens can remain physically well and be prepared to assume the task of rehabilitation once an emergency is over."

Timber group is organized

LAKEVIEW (UPI) — Formation of a committee called FACTS to "wake the town and tell the people" about economic dependency on National Forest timber was announced Thursday.

Carter Fetsch, local merchant and past president of the Chamber of Commerce, is chairman of the group which derives its name from Federal and Community Timber Supply.

Fetsch said the local group would try to develop public understanding of problems which affect National Forests and sawmill and logging operators. Fetsch said FACTS would seek to cooperate with operators and the Forest Service in seeking solution to problems.

He said need for a continuing program of public awareness became apparent last spring when a Chamber of Commerce planning committee found timber industry payrolls were about \$1.8 million annually, one third less than two years earlier.

Enrollment up, 2 more classes are necessary

MADRAS — Swelling enrollment totals at the Madras Elementary school district 509C will necessitate the adding of two more classes in the district, it was announced this week by Gerald Newton, district superintendent.

Enrollment in the district as of Wednesday had reached 1348 students in the three school buildings of the district. This is a new all time high, Newton said. Last year at this time total enrollment was 1152.

Two new teachers are being added to the school system as a result of the student total and a first grade will be added at Warm Springs and another fifth grade class at the Madras grade school buildings.

Enrollment by schools now totals 304 at Warm Springs, 692 at the grade school and 352 at the junior high school.

The systems now has eight first grade classes; seven seconds; six each in the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades and five sections in each of the seventh and eighth grades.

The district superintendent said Mrs. Dorothy Smith, a 1961 graduate of Oregon College of Education, has been signed as teacher of the newly created fifth grade class at the grade school and interviews are arranged to select a teacher for the additional first grade class at Warm Springs.
