

Chinese charge rejected by U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has flatly rejected a Chinese Communist charge that the United States was responsible for the Chinese Nationalist U2 plane shot down over the Red mainland Sept. 9, it was disclosed today.

The Communist charge was made, and immediately rejected, at a Warsaw meeting Thursday between U.S. Ambassador John M. Cabot and Communist China's envoy to Poland, Wang Ping-nan.

State Department Press Officer Lincoln White declined at briefing today to disclose the subject of the meeting. He said there was an agreement with the Chinese Communists not to release any details of Warsaw meetings without mutual agreement.

Other officials said Wang repeated official charges made earlier this month by the Peking Radio. The Communists alleged that Chinese Nationalists' U2 flights over the mainland actually were under the direction of the United States. Peking cited them as evidence of additional American "aggressions."

Officials said Cabot told Wang the same thing the State Department declared publicly about 10 days ago. It said then that Nationalist China was permitted to buy two U2 planes from Lockheed Aircraft Corp. during the latter part of 1960.

Officials said that no further planes of this type had been furnished the Nationalists. They also indicated there were no plans to let them replace the one they lost.

Charges made

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The two Republicans on the Senate investigations subcommittee have charged that testimony proves Billie Sol Estes got special favors from the Kennedy administration's Agriculture Department.

Sens. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., and Carl T. Curtis, R-Neb., made the charge in New Frontier News, published by the Republican National Committee.

The same story also accused Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman and his "cronies" of using "the big lie technique," "whitewash," and "cover-up" in the Estes case.

The Senate subcommittee's investigation of Estes' cotton allotment deals now is in recess, subject to the call of Chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark.

More witnesses are scheduled, and Estes may be called for testimony if his court case does not start as scheduled next Monday. The subcommittee has issued no reports to date on its inquiry.

RESOLUTION PASSED

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Thursday passed a resolution calling upon President Kennedy to seek an international conference for the conservation of fisheries on the high seas.

The resolution, introduced by Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., was cosponsored by Sens. Leverett Saltonstall, R-Mass.; Benjamin A. Smith, D-Mass.; and E. L. Bartlett, D-Alaska.

Magnuson earlier had recommended that Smith be named as a U.S. delegate to such a conference.

Indian troops battle Chinese

NEW DELHI (UPI)—An official spokesman announced today that Indian troops were battling Chinese Communist forces at an outpost on the disputed northeast frontier.

The Chinese and Indians exchanged fire throughout the night and were still shooting this morning at the Dhola post, the spokesman said.

Three Indians were reported wounded. An earlier Chinese Communist report said one Chinese border guard was killed and another wounded in a frontier battle with Indian forces.

Reports of the fighting coincided with an announcement that India has accepted a Chinese proposal to hold discussions on the border dispute.

An official Indian spokesman said the talks would begin in the Chinese Communist capital of Peking Oct. 15.

Peiping's New China news agency, in a dispatch monitored in Tokyo, reported that Indian and Chinese Communist troops were engaged in battle on India's border with Tibet today.

Sentencing due for Charloe boy

Dennis Eugene Charloe, 17, an escapee from MacLaren School for Boys, will appear before Circuit Judge Robert H. Foley for sentence on a rape charge, when a pre-sentence report by the State Board of Parole and Probation is completed.

Charloe pleaded guilty before Judge Foley earlier this week, when he waived grand jury indictment. He had been arrested following an attack on a Bend girl several weeks ago at the Horse Caves.

At the pleading, there was no recommendation for a psychiatric examination.

A pre-sentence investigation was also ordered for James Robert Melton, who waived grand jury indictment and pleaded guilty to a larceny charge.

No indication of military moves on Cuba

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States was making it increasingly plain today it intended to enforce a policy of containment on Cuba, balking any aggressive designs that Soviet-backed Fidel Castro might have in Latin America.

But the U.S. government gave no indication that bold new military moves and shifts of forces were necessary now in the Caribbean area to carry out its policy.

Adequate power apparently was on hand in the right places, although it was evident there would be increased military reconnaissance operations around Cuba and along the Atlantic shipping routes over which Russian arms flow to the island.

Should greater strength prove to be needed later, it could be assembled quickly from the huge Atlantic fleet and U.S. bases.

That the increased surveillance of Cuba's military buildup could bring clashes was acknowledged freely by Secretary of State Dean Rusk in congressional testimony made public Thursday.

The policy sketched in recent days by President Kennedy and Rusk seems to be this:

A sort of one-way quarantine would be enforced on Cuba. There would, apparently, be no effort now to blockade the island against Soviet arms and manpower imports — a step that could result in direct contact and possibly conflict between U.S. and Russian forces if attempted. But any effort to use Cuba as a base for export of arms or troops to other Latin American countries would be stopped.

To keep Cuban communism thus pinned down, the United States has available huge portions of the Atlantic fleet and Marine forces and a recently enlarged Caribbean command based in the Panama Canal Zone.
