Garden Clubs plan session at Prineville

PRINEVILLE — The district meeting of Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs will be held Thursday, September 27, at the Episcopal Church, First and Holly Streets, in Prineville. Clubs in Bend, Redmond, Madras, Culver, Powell Butte, Gilchrist, Chemult and Prineville will participate.

Donald J. Martel, head of the department of landscape architecture at Oregon State University, will be the main speaker. He will show pictures and talk on "Making the Most of Your Plants."

Martel assisted the state garden clubs committee in planning landscape courses, and taught classes that many members attended recently at OSU. He was recipient of the horticulture award given at the state garden club convention at Salem in June.

The Crook County and Ocoee Garden Clubs will be hostesses for the meeting, which will start with a coffee hour and registration from 9 to 10 a.m. A nominating committee will be elected. Luncheon will be served at noon by the Episcopal Guild, with a charge to be made.

Appearing on the afternoon program in addition to Martel will be Claude Mills from Miller Products, Portland. Known as the dean of Northwest gardening and horticulture, Mills is much in demand as a public speaker. His lectures are profusely illustrated with color slides. Before joining the Miller firm in 1955, he was with the Charles H. Lilly Co. in Portland for six years, and prior to that, owned his own landscape and design business.

U. S. feed grain stocks may be cut to lowest level since '58

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department predicted today that feed grain stocks may be cut next fall to the lowest level since 1958.

If this forecast is correct, it will mean a cut of 27 per cent in feed grain surpluses in the two years of the government's emergency feed grain acreage reduction program.

In the fall of 1961, at the end of the marketing season in which the 1960 crop was used, carryover surplus amounted to nearly 85 million tons. This fall, the surplus is down to an estimated 73 million tons.

During the coming 12 months, farmers and merchants will be using and selling the 1962 feed grain crop. The Agriculture Department estimates production will be 10 to 12 million tons below the total demand.

This means more grain will be pulled out of the surplus stockpile. By next fall, the surplus may be down to about 62 million tons, a two-year cut of 23 million tons, or about 27 per cent.

The surplus figure forecast for next fall is the lowest since the fall of 1958. At that time, the stock was 99 million tons.

The Agriculture Department also said in a feed situation report today that feed grain prices this fall and winter should be close to the levels of one year ago.

on recreation is increasing.

Recent Commerce Department studies indicate that the average American spent more than \$112 on recreation in 1961. This was a 17 per cent increase over 1955.

Not all of this, of course, was for outdoor recreation. The Commerce Department figures cover a wide range of activities ranging from the purchase of books to race-track betting. And the figures do not cover some outdoor recreation items like the use of automobiles on camping trips.

The Commerce Department study groups recreation items into a number of categories. The group including spending on sports equipment and boats showed a 25 per cent increase from 1955 through 1961. The group of widely varied items which includes camp fees showed a 29 per cent increase.

Increased flow of news from White House due

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The White House has taken three steps to increase the flow of communications between the President and the American people, according to Presidential Press Secretary Pierre Salinger.

He told a convention of the Radio-Television News Directors Association Thursday the White House has tried to increase the competitive flow of news, has tried to do away with "middlemen," and has opened the President's press conferences to live television.

Salinger said that in order to increase the competitive flow of news, the White House has tried to help radio, television and other news media develop their own stories on an exclusive basis.

He said that he and his associates on the President's news staff have made every effort to put correspondents directly in touch with the government official they wish to see. Formerly Salinger said, it was necessary to deal with an intermediate official, or "middleman."

The press secretary said the opening of press conferences to live television was having a tremendous impact on the people.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Atomic Energy Commission held the 51st announced test in its underground series at the Nevada test site Thursday. It said the shot was of low yield, meaning the equivalent of less than 20,000 tons of TNT.

Nine-megaton blast detonated

UPPSALA, Sweden (UPI) — The Soviet Union detonated a nine-megaton nuclear device in the atmosphere in the Novaya Zemlya area in the Arctic today, the Uppsala Seismographic Institute announced.

The blast was the 12th reported by the institute in the current nuclear test series in the Soviet Union. These figures apparently refer only to tests at Novaya Zemlya. The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission has disclosed two others, at Semipalatinsk in central Siberia, for a total of 14, and said there have been additional explosions which it has not announced.
