Five divorce decrees granted

Five divorce decrees were granted by Circuit Judge Robert H. Foley this week in Deschutes county.

Jeanene A. Burmeister, 1963 W. Third Street, was given a divorce from Alan B. Burmeister, Cottage Grove. They had been married November 15, 1938, after being divorced in May that year. They were first married in November, 1932.

Mrs. Burmeister was given custody of the three minor children, \$50 monthly support for each, and household goods. Each party takes an automobile.

Melford L. Woodward was granted a divorce from Mary A. Woodward, to whom he was married June 27, 1951, in Portland. A property settlement agreement was approved, and the defendant was given custody of the couple's minor child and \$50 monthly support.

Ruth Carmen Williams won a divorce suit from Edward John Williams, household goods and attorney's fees. They were married Dec. 20, 1953, in Bend.

Haynes given two year term

Haynes had pleaded guilty to a charge of burglarizing the Redmond Copeland Yards building last June. In the meantime, he had been found guilty by a jury of an attempted burglary at the Powder Keg in Redmond, and placed on probation.

Voters approve bond proposal

MADRAS — A \$400,000 bond issue for a building program in the Culver School District No. 4 to construct a new high school, some new grade school classrooms and other remodeling and additions was approved by voters of the district this week at a special school bond election.

Vote on the proposal to bond the district for the building program saw 109 voters favoring the program with 87 no votes cast. The total of 196 votes cast represents 73 per cent of the approximately 270 registered voters in the district.

Approval of the bond issue clears the way for proceeding with construction of the building. School spokesmen said this week that federal funds under public law 815 have been applied for by the district.

Mrs. Viola Frances Jonas, 85, member of a pioneer Oregon family and a former Bend resident, died December 10 at Bremerton, Wash., following a week's illness. She and her husband, who died in 1955, moved to Bremerton from Bend in May, 1941.

Born July 4, 1877, on a farm near Stayton, Mrs. Jonas migrated from Oregon to Colville, Wash., by covered wagon with her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Fry, and seven brothers and sisters. There she was married in 1893 to Ernest I. Jonas.

Mr. and Mrs. Jonas lived in Bend at two different periods of time. For the past three and a half years, Mrs. Jonas made her home with a daughter, Mrs. William (Margaret) Pepper, in Bremerton.

She is survived also by another daughter, Mrs. W. E. Page of Rochester, Wash.; a son, Lee H. Jonas of Adak, Alaska; seven grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren. Three of her six children preceded her in death.

Services were held at the Bremerton Free Methodist Church, of which she was a member.

Incoming mail peak reached

Federal grant due for state

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Oregon will receive a \$15,000 grant from the federal government for the new public health service radiological program in the nation, Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said Wednesday.

The program is designed to assist in the development of state capabilities in the field of radiological health.

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
