County road work approved

Eight projects in four Oregon counties were approved Thursday by the Oregon State Highway Commission as part of the construction work authorized during the 1963 session on the county Federal-aid Secondary System.

The projects will be in Deschutes, Douglas, Grant and Multnomah counties. Contracts on the projects will be let in early 1963. Three projects are scheduled in Deschutes County, each involving an oil mat for county roads. The three are the Fall River Resort-Deschutes River Section of the Fall River Road, one mile on the Pettigrew Road, and one mile on the Stevens Road.

Oregon community college association is organized

Organization of the Oregon State Association of Community Colleges was completed at a meeting in Salem earlier this week attended by Richard P. McRae, Prineville, a member of the Central Oregon College District board; Don Pence, COC president, and Dr. Orde S. Pinckney and Don Burd of the COC staff.

Basically, the new state organization will consist of four sections: 1. Administrative officers, members of boards of education, other staff and faculty members and members of student governing bodies. Each section will elect its own officers, with a central coordinating committee planned.

The administrators' section elected Dr. Wendell L. Van Loan, president of South West Oregon College, as chairman; Richard Ross, president of Clatsop County College, as vice-chairman; William Cox, Director of Eugene Technical - Vocational School, as secretary - treasurer; and Dr. Pence, president of Central Oregon College, as representative at large.

The board members' section elected W. A. Jordan, North Bend, as chairman of the section; Richard P. McRae, Prineville, official representative of the Central Oregon College board, was named vice - chairman; Arthur Fertig, Astoria, chairman of Clatsop County College Board, secretary-treasurer; and Ray Cates, Salem, Salem Public School Board, was elected member at large.

The faculty section elected Ralph L. Seefeld of Clatsop County College as chairman; J. H. Humphrey of South West Oregon College, vice - chairman; Don Burd of Central Oregon College, secretary - treasurer; and Frank Zarkowski of the Salem Technical - Vocational School, a member at large.

These three executive committees consisting of 12 members make up the Central Coordinating Committee, the chief policy-making instrument of the organization. This committee is to be headed by Dr. Pence, president of Central Oregon College, with Arthur Fertig, chairman of the Clatsop County College board, as vice - chairman. J. H. Humphrey, English instructor from South West College will be secretary and Richard P. McRae, official board representative from Central Oregon College, will be treasurer.

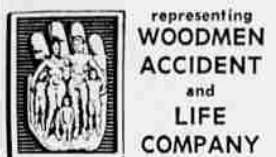

Road monies are allocated

Allocation of some \$3,746,000 for county road construction has been made by the Oregon State Highway Commission. The funds, which go to all 36 counties in the state, include \$2,247,331 in federal money, with the remainder split between county and state matching monies.

The federal money comes from the 1964 Federal-aid Secondary Highway Funds. The allocations are computed in accordance with the formula developed by the Association of Oregon Counties, using the 1960 census figures and the 1962 county road mileages.

The funds will be made available to the counties immediately, so that they might select construction projects on their county road systems.

The \$2,247,331 federal money was allotted to the counties as follows: Crook, \$35,387; Deschutes, \$40,178; and Jefferson, \$32,371.
