They said 2,600 Protestants and Roman Catholics will cross Christmas Eve and return the next day. Orthodox pilgrims plan to cross Jan. 6 and Armenians plan to make the trip Jan. 18.

Oregon has \$36 million cash balance

SALEM (UPI) — A cash balance of \$36 million was in the state general fund on Nov. 30, Legislative Fiscal Officer Kenneth Bragg said at the Biennial Tax Conference here Thursday.

He said about \$25.5 million was earmarked for special funds.

Bragg said, "There has been much talk recently of possible deficits, so I decided to check our present cash balance."

He said while budget deficits threatened, there was no shortage of cash.

He told legislators that monies within the fund could be shifted through inter-fund loans to make up for deficits, but the money must be paid back.

"This gives us a buffer, and more flexibility," he said.

He told the 23 legislators and 72 others attending the conference that changes in the price of liquor would increase alcohol revenues from \$31.9 million to \$34 million next biennium.

He explained a 4-cent a pack tax on cigarettes would produce about \$18 million during the two-year fiscal period, and proposed income taxes would raise \$239.7 million during the biennium.

Bragg predicted a \$470 million budget during the 1965-67 biennium, up from the \$405.3 million called for the 1963-65 biennium by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Holiday dinner plans reported

SALEM (UPI) — Take four tons of turkey, stuff with 600 gallons of dressing, cover with 600 gallons of giblet gravy, and you have the beginnings of the traditional Christmas dinner to be served in state institutions next Tuesday.

More than 10,500 patients, students and inmates at institutions administered by the Board of Control will be served the holiday dinner. Foods Administrator Charles R. Knapp said.

It took a giant-size shopping cart to handle the ingredients.

In addition to the turkey, dressing and gravy, cooks and kitchen helpers will prepare 5,200 pounds of sweet potatoes, 5,800 pounds of white spuds, and 600 gallons of frozen peas.

Half-a-ton of cranberry sauce will be required.

Eight-hundred gallons of salad will be served, along with 400 gallons of pickles, 400 gallons of olives and 20 crates of celery.

One-hundred pounds of butter will be spread over 12,000 dinner rolls.

Fruit cake—2,500 pounds of it—will be washed down with 1,200 gallons of coffee, Knapp said.

Linda runs up big booze bill

Savannah visit due in Portland

PORTLAND (UPI) — The nuclear ship Savannah will dock in Portland Jan. 4 as scheduled, officials of States Marine Lines announced Wednesday.

The Savannah, the world's first nuclear-powered freighter, has been tied up at Long Beach, Calif., because of a labor dispute.

States Marine Lines, which operated the vessel for the Atomic Energy Commission and the Federal Maritime Administration, said she will depart for Honolulu in the next few days and then leave for Portland Dec. 28.

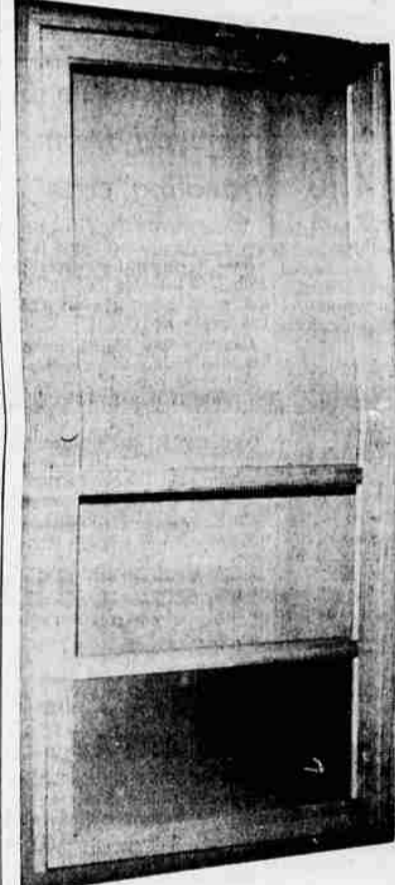
