Trustees okay use of paddle

WOODSIDE, Calif. (UPI) — Trustees of the Portola Valley School District have approved spanking with a "light broad paddle" as a disciplinary measure for some students.

However, the decision, scheduled for ratification at the school board's next regular meeting, set forth certain limitations to the means and extent of corporal punishment.

The trustees said the spankings must be administered by the principal in the presence of a "certified witness," and only after permission is obtained from the parents.

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Visit to Russia ended by Tito

MOSCOW (UPI) — Yugoslav President Tito ended his Soviet "vacation" today and headed home, apparently with Premier Nikita Khrushchev's promise of more Soviet aid and political cooperation.

Tito and Khrushchev parted Thursday at the train station in Kiev, where they had gone together Tuesday night after finishing their talks in Moscow.

Tito was expected to leave the Soviet Union and cross into Czechoslovakia sometime today on his way to Belgrade. It was not known if Khrushchev would return to Moscow or go to his Black Sea vacation home.

In speeches just before Tito's train left, Khrushchev underscored his determination to go ahead with his tightening of Soviet-Yugoslav ties, despite Communist Chinese opposition.

Western observers here believed one purpose of Tito's visit was to try to work out some form of economic cooperation with Comecon, the socialist-bloc answer to the European Common Market, while still not becoming a member of the organization or jeopardizing his trade ties with the West.

Deadline faces negotiators

NEW YORK (UPI) — Negotiators, working under a weekend strike deadline and appeals by Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, resume talks today in the maritime dispute that threatens shipping from Maine to Texas.

Top federal mediators slated a meeting with management and the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA), which may call 75,000 members off East and Gulf Coast docks at 5 p.m. Sunday.

Wirtz, who has warned the walkout could "cripple the country," addressed bargainers for both the ILA and the New York Shipping Association (NYSA) on Thursday night following another round of fruitless contract discussions.

William Simkin, director of the federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, said both sides had turned down Wirtz' suggestion to temporarily sidestep the issue of work gang size that has deadlocked the talks.

His proposal included the establishment of a special committee to study the issue of work gangs for seven months while the current contract is extended, then make non-binding recommendations.

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Mona Lisa to be removed from traveling case

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Museum experts planned today to remove the Mona Lisa from the aluminum traveling case in which the great painting was placed two weeks ago.

Leonardo Da Vinci's portrait has been resting in an air-conditioned vault since it arrived at the National Gallery of Art on Wednesday afternoon from Paris.

Originally it was thought the Mona Lisa would be uncased Thursday, but this was changed.

The Mona Lisa was removed from its niche in the Louvre museum on Dec. 13 and put into its case.

The painting will remain in the vault at the National Gallery until it goes on public display Jan. 8.

Rustler given eight years

CANYON CITY (UPI) — Confessed cattle rustler Melville Eric Kelly, Mt. Vernon, was sentenced Thursday to eight years in the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Kelly, the father of six children, pleaded guilty to charges of stealing more than 200 head of cattle in Grant, Harney and Malheur Counties in the past year.

Authorities still are investigating several hundred other thefts on the possibility that the 39-year-old Kelly may have been responsible for them.

Haines case is continued

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI) — Arraignment of Jerry Richard Haines, 24, on a first degree murder charge was continued again Wednesday in district court here.

Haines asked the court to appoint an attorney to defend him. No date was set for his next appearance.

Haines is accused of shooting his expectant wife, Christine, at their home here Monday. He was arraigned Tuesday, but asked for time to arrange for an attorney.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Shakespeare, they say, had a word for everything.

Earlier this month, I contrived a little interview with the immortal bard to show how he might have felt about the tax cut issue soon to come before Congress.

Since then I have been skimming through his works on the lookout for quotations that might

Soviets charged with deceit in moratorium plan

GENEVA (UPI) — The United States accused the Soviet Union Wednesday of wanting an uncontrolled moratorium on nuclear testing so it can be free to break promises like those it made over the shipment of weapons to Cuba.

American Ambassador Arthur H. Dean told the 17-nation Disarmament Conference the West will never agree to a situation where a test ban depends on Russian good faith.

Dean also accused the Russians of refusing an interim agreement banning all tests so they could go on testing their own nuclear weapons.

He noted Tuesday's announcement by the Atomic Energy Commission in Washington that the Soviets had exploded two intermediate yield nuclear tests in the atmosphere over Novaya Zemlya earlier this week.

"The Soviet Union wants to impose another unilateral arrangement in lieu of an effective and workable negotiated treaty ending all tests," Dean said.

"Under this the Soviet Union would be free to break its pledge, just as it broke Nikita Khrushchev's solemn pledge of Jan. 14, 1960, and Foreign Minister Gromyko's statement that the Russians were shipping no offensive missiles to Cuba."

Khrushchev promised, in a speech Jan. 14, 1960, that the Soviets would never be the first to resume testing. Less than two years later, Sept. 3, 1961, the Russians broke the three-year test moratorium with the first of their blasts over Novaya Zemlya.

"No matter how many times the Soviet Union violates its clear and unmistakable statements, we are asked to give them another chance and to trust them just once more," Dean said today.

"But the United States is not prepared to accept another said experience on a unilateral untested moratorium on tests, nor are we prepared to accept an unworkable system of 'black boxes' in our Christmas stockings."

My wife, I might add, is aware that "all that glitters is not gold." She is no "snapper-up of unconsidered trifles." As a shopper, her Shakespearean motto is "let every eye negotiate for itself and trust no agent."

But anyone who has encountered the "many-headed multitude" in a department store cannot help but wish "that this too too solid flesh would melt, thaw and resolve itself into a dew."

I went out once to get my wife a gift, but the expedition resulted in "a beggarly account of empty boxes." The downtown traffic had me exclaiming "a horse! a horse! my kingdom for a horse."

After 30 minutes of looking for a parking place, I said to myself "let us make an honorable retreat." I figured "I were better to be eaten to death with a rust than to be scour'd to nothing with perpetual motion."

Resolves Problem

Rather than make a second attempt — "what! wouldst thou have a serpent sting thee twice?" — I let Shakespeare solve the problem for me. His gift suggestion "sweets to the sweet."

I stopped by a neighborhood drug store and bought her a box of candy.

It is not only the crowds and traffic that overpower me. I object to the "straining harsh discords and unpleasant sharps" of recorded Christmas carols. "That way madness lies."

To me they sound like "the vile squeaking of the wry-necked fife." I agree with the Shakespearean assertion that "silence is the perfectest herald of joy."

As for my own voice, "I have lost it with hallowing and singing of anthems." Which leaves me with just enough breath to say with Shakespeare "enough, with over-measure."
