PRINEVILLE — Services of varying celebrative nature will be held at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, December 23 through 26, it is announced by Rev. John Gretz, rector.

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Miner terms community colleges education bargain

SALEM (UPI)—Dr. Leon Minar termed Oregon's community colleges a bargain here Wednesday in a discussion of his education department's efforts to cope with a booming school population from primary grades on up.

The superintendent of public instruction spoke at a pre-legislative fiscal conference for members of the 1963 Legislature that convenes in January.

Dr. Minar asked for money to keep the community college program growing.

He also asked for increases to bring the salaries of his own staff up to par with those paid to higher education employees in Oregon, and for \$11 million more than the governor proposes to increase the state's share of elementary school costs.

Minar said it is costing \$576 to send a student to a community college compared to \$750 to send a pupil to a university. His department is asking for \$9 million to pay the state's two-thirds share of the community college program in the next biennium.

Minar told the legislators community colleges "represent your one hope of getting young men and women trained with job skills so they can go out and get a job."

Plea Supported

Minar's plea was cautiously fortified by a report released by the Legislative Interim Committee on Education. It notes that the 41,000 public and private post-high school students are expected to increase to 92,000 in a decade.

The committee said, however, it is suggesting additional controls on establishment of community colleges, program revisions, and "a more realistic state contribution program."

Open house set by firemen

PRINEVILLE — Great heaps of shinningly rejuvenated toys will be on display in Prineville's fire hall tonight from 7 to 9:30 p.m. when the volunteer firemen hold a public open house. The community is invited to visit the fire hall and see the results of the work that firemen have been doing for many weeks, in repairing, painting and polishing donated toys.

The toys will be distributed to needy families in time for Christmas Eve.

Fire chief Ted Adamson stated that the fire department felt more toys could readily be distributed and invited those who attend the open house to bring with them a new toy or a slightly used toy in good condition. No time is left for repair work, he said. Toys especially needed are toys for boys.

Donations of used toys during the past weeks have been lighter than usual, Adamson pointed out, causing the last minute plea for additional toys and games for youngsters.

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UN assembly accepts Yemen credentials, then adjourns

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—The General Assembly accepted credentials of Yemen's revolutionary government, newly recognized by the United States, before adjourning its 17th annual session early today.

This was the first General Assembly in memory to end before its target date. Adjournment had been set for Saturday.

The 110-nation world parliament is expected to be called back into special session, probably in May, to consider the problems of financing the highly expensive peace-keeping operations of the United Nations.

Recognize Yemen Revolutionaries

In its final action before the gavel fell at 12:05 a.m. EST the assembly voted 74-3 with 23 abstentions, to accept the report of its credentials committee which recommended recognition of Yemen's revolutionary government. It also withheld approval of Communist Hungary—as it has every year since the 1956 freedom revolt — and, over Communist objections, upheld the right of the Formosa government to hold China's U.N. seat.

U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson and Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin both called news conferences today to offer their assessments of the session.

Western diplomats were generally satisfied with the session. Most felt the debates had lost the emotionalism of the past two years and had moved ahead steadily under the firm leadership of assembly President Muhammad Zafrulla Khan of Pakistan.

The overriding issue of the three-month session was the Cuban crisis, which was handled outside the assembly. The lingering Congo problem remained unresolved. The Berlin question, which had been expected to receive keen attention, barely was mentioned.

Peace Operations Continued

The session ended with a flurry of financial items, which included authorization for Secretary General Thant to continue the Congo and Middle East operations until next June 30 at a cost of \$11.6 million-a-month.

Final-stage actions also asked Thant to do what "he deems helpful" to restore human rights in Hungary and called for continued conciliation and relief efforts in Palestine.

The three principal accomplishments on agenda items were the election of Thant, the quiet Burmese Buddhist, as secretary general for a full term expiring in November, 1966; acceptance of a World Court advisory opinion that assessments for peace-keeping costs are binding on all members; and the scheduling of an international trade conference to consider ways of speeding the economic progress of developing countries.
