## Madras Buff baseballers again take 'schnitzel'

MADRAS — It might be sunnier in Madras these days than it is in some other Central Oregon communities, but one certainly could not say that Madras is on "the sunny side of the street."

We are referring to baseball. Old lady fortune doesn't smile on the Madrasites at all when it comes to the national pastime. Madras cannot beg, buy or steal a ball game. And yesterday proved to be a triple disaster for Coach Roger Diddocks' diamond crew.

Bend came to town yesterday, and what happened to the Buffs would make you laugh all the way down the score sheet. The visiting Bend Lava Bears went a 10-round go-around with the Buffs in the opener, and held on to lady fortune to pick up a victory that had the scorekeepers going wacky. (Both halves of a twin bill are slated seven innings.)

In order for Bend to do it, Coach Bill Bauer had to go through four pitchers, and a mass personnel shift. It did work however, as Bend won it 6-5 in ten frames.

At the end of the regular seven innings, the two were deadlocked at 4-4. It had happened this way. Madras at the end of the third inning had the visitors on this mat to the tune of 3-0, but the Bruins came back scoring two runs each in the fifth and seventh innings to knot it up.

After that, Madras fell behind and blasted one run in the tenth when minute Larry Barnes rapped a single to bring in shortstop Prjday. Friday had teed-off on third reliever Jerry Wetle for a triple. The one-run rally fell short of the mark, however, as Bend had scored two in its half of the inning.

Coach Roger Diddocks was singing the blues today. He said, "It's all very unfortunate, we deserved to win that first one, and... that second one... well I thought we had it."

Diddocks was referring to something that is peculiar to the game of baseball at Madras or anywhere where there are no lights for night baseball.

Madras, seeking revenge for the first outing of the day and nearly a dozen other losses throughout the season, went into a frenzy in the third inning and exploded for 11 runs.

Tearing the Bears apart at will, the Madras hitters were pasting the ball all over the lot. But this 11-run outburst still wasn't enough. The game was called because of darkness! Madras held the lead 11-3, and there wasn't any question about what was in store for Bend in future innings: more Madras hitting.

Madras nearly batted around twice in that third frame. The league rules say that if a game does not go five innings, the ball game doesn't count. The Madras umpire called the whole thing off in the top of the fourth.

Madras, who has now gone a single win against 12 losses in league play, is beginning to "push the New York Mets for the 'sack' reputation.

This, yesterday, was only two setbacks for the Buffs. Why then was it a triple disaster? Diddocks' diamond crew took it in the head in the seventh inning of the first encounter with a little "brother double trouble." Vic Suratt, centerfielder, and his brother Doug, second base, were chasing a little blooper fly over second base. The inevitable happened (fans could see it developing). They both called for it and collided just beyond the bag. Doug held onto the ball for the put-out, and bounced right back up off the ground. Vic however remained prone and didn't get up... and didn't get up. Pretty soon

a big crowd had gathered around the prostrate Suratt in shallow center field.

It took 20 minutes to summon an ambulance and haul him to Central Oregon District Hospital in Redmond. He is in "good" condition there today, and apparently will be ready to go home tomorrow.

He was still unconscious when they loaded him into the ambulance. Coach Diddocks said today, "Vic had opened his eyes, but would not respond to anything... he really took a tap on the head... I think it was his brother's knee that knocked him out."

Hospital attendants said today that Vic is suffering from a mild brain concussion.

Roger Diddocks is suffering from something worse... a baseball team (with all of its alleged potential) that just can't win.

Bend's Wetle got credit for the win. Little Larry Barnes went the entire distance for the losers, and was credited with the loss.

Rogers extended a special invitation to skiers.

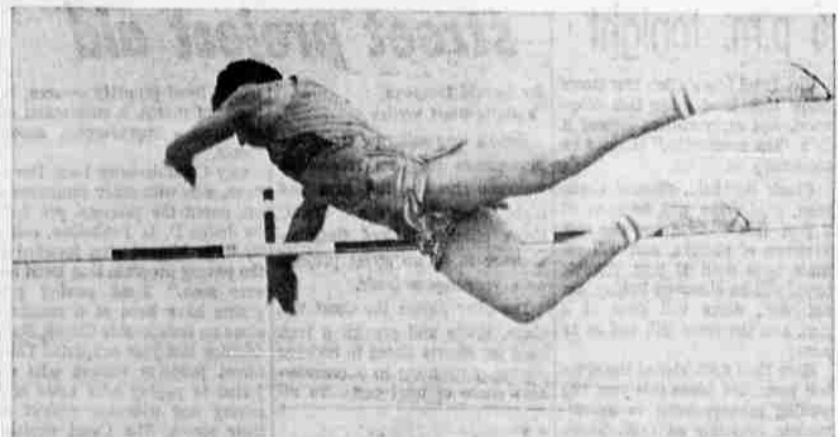
Oregon State University and the University of Idaho baseball

## UW ready for Ducks in track

SEATTLE — University of Washington's track and field team winds up its 1963 dual meet season this Saturday, traveling south to do battle with the high-powered Oregon Ducks.

While the defending national champions from Eugene will be heavily favored, the Huskies figure to salvage some glory on the strength of several fine individuals. Foremost of these, of course, is Brian Sternberg, who at 19 has taken his place among the world's leading pole vaulters. The young Husky sophomore set a world's mark of 16-5 two weeks ago at the Penn Relays at Philadelphia.

He saw the mark fall three days later, however, when John Pennell of Northeast Louisiana cleared 16-6½.

Sternberg failed in an attempt to regain the record last Saturday against Washington State, as he was favoring a sore tendon in his right arm.

## L. A. Dodgers exploding

That bomb Walter Alston was supposed to be sitting on has exploded—and all but tore apart the St. Louis Cardinal pitching staff.

It only goes to show what the Los Angeles Dodgers can do when they stop fighting among themselves and concentrate on the enemy. Forty-eight hours ago the Dodgers looked like they were coming apart at the seams. Today they look—at least to shell-shocked Cardinal pitchers—like the team that is favored to win the National League pennant.

The Dodgers accomplished the turnaround with a two-game display of power that accounted for 22 runs on 26 hits. The fireworks included six doubles, two triples and four homers powering the way to successive 11-1 and 11-5 victories over the Cardinals.

**Musial Sets Record**  
The latter, accomplished with six runs in the last two innings Wednesday night, enabled the Dodgers to celebrate despite a home run by Stan Musial which enabled the 42-year-old Cardinal star to pass Babe Ruth and set a new major league career record of 1,357 extra base hits. Musial's history-making homer came in the fourth inning off

Bob Miller and was his second round tripper of the season.

The San Francisco Giants walloped the Milwaukee Braves, 12-5, the Chicago Cubs beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9-5, the Cincinnati Reds topped the Houston Colts, 3-2, and the New York Mets edged the Philadelphia Phils, 3-2, in other NL action.

**Tigers Beat Yanks**  
In the American League, the Chicago White Sox beat the Kansas City Athletics, 8-3, the Detroit Tigers downed the New York Yankees, 7-6, the Baltimore Orioles crushed the Boston Red Sox, 10-4, the Los Angeles Angels nipped the Minnesota Twins, 4-3, and the Washington Senators defeated the Cleveland Indians, 6-3, in 13 innings.

Willie Davis drove in three runs with two homers and a triple, Wally Moon had a double and two singles, Maury Wills, Jim Gilliam and Ron Fairly had two hits each and Dodger baserunners stole four bases in the carnival at St. Louis. Ron Peranowski, who pitched 2-3 innings of middle-inning relief, received credit for his fifth win against one defeat.
