WHS girls win two, up streak to six

After losing a three-point lead in the final two seconds of regulation, the Wallowa girls' basketball team (5-2 league and 9-7 overall) responded on the road Saturday for a 48-47 overtime win to record it sixth straight victory.

The victim Saturday was what had been the league's No. 2 team from Nixyaawii and came a mere 24 hours following a 37-19 Cougar victory against Powder Valley in North Powder.

Interesting enough, earlier during this season, when WHS was struggling to gain its identity, Wallowa lost decisively to both these teams by 15- and 22-point margins respectively.

Wallowa coach Greg Oveson boils down the improved play of his team to the word "confidence." Yet that confidence comes from many factors, Oveson says, including the fact his team is "playing as a team," "playing team defense," and "hitting some outside shots."

A new pride in rebounding also is paying huge dividends for the Cougars who downed the league's No. 1 team from Echo a week earlier. Aggressive rebounding efforts from the likes of Lauren Makin, Savannah Nobles, and Macey Frei are providing more scoring opportunities for the Cougars, and yet it's the dominant play of senior Calli Miller on the backboards that's setting the tone. Miller snared a total of 31 rebounds during the two wins last weekend.

Wallowa opened Friday's game with three three-point field goals in the opening minutes against the host Badgers, two by Frei and one by Taylor Harshfield, and zoomed to an early lead en route to the lopsided win.

Against Powder Valley, Harshfield scored 15 points, Makin 12, Frei six, and Miller

Trailing 43-40 with only two seconds remaining on the clock, the end of regulation worked out to perfection for Nixyaawii when an Eagle player made the first of two free throws, intentionally missed the second, grabbed the rebound, and tossed the ball in to demand overtime.

A big play in the overtime victory came when Wallowa's Frei snared a rebound off a teammate's missed free throw and put the basketball in the hoop to earn a three-point lead that melted, but didn't go

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More shooting woes saddle Wallowa boys

A team that hasn't scored 50 points in any of its last 13 games and has lost five of its last six encounters, the Wallowa boys (2-5 league and 6-10 overall), might find the needed antidote this coming weekend during a pair of 1A-7 Old Oregon League games.

Struggling to shoot the basketball and, according to Wallowa coach Greg Oveson, "playing with zero confidence," WHS could get a shot in the arm Friday and Saturday when it plays host to Griswold one day before taking the team bus to Halfway Saturday to visit Pine Eagle.

Griswold, from Helix, is winless in seven league games this season and has won two of 16 games overall.

If WHS can get past Griswold, a confidence-brimming upset might be manufactured against the Spartans. PE is cruising through the Old Oregon League with a 5-1 record, and yet has proven to be totally beatable outside league where Pine Eagle has posted a 1-7 mark.

Last weekend, however, did not help the confidence of any player suited up in blackand-orange when Wallowa tumbled hard twice — Friday by a 61-30 score at Powder Valley (3-4 league and 7-9 overall) and Saturday by a 56-26 score at Nixyaawii (6-0 league and 11-6 overall).

The Enterprise Outlaw girls had a Friday night bye and came out strong Saturday evening, Jan. 24, beating the Elgin Huskies by a considerable margin, 48-30. The Lady Outlaws are now 8-8 on the season and 3-4 in league play. If the season ended today, they'd be seeded fourth in district play.

"We played really well on both sides of

the court," Enterprise coach Mike Crawford said. "We cut down on our turnovers, the girls shot well and were excellent at the free throw line. It was a good game for us."

Both teams started with an offensive spurt, putting in a combined 22 points scored in the first period, Elgin holding the narrow 12-10 advantage. The Outlaws outscored Elgin 11-6 in the second period to go into halftime with a 21-17 lead.

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E-Gals lose 2

The Joseph E-Gals came up with the short end of the stick twice in the last week, falling to Helix 44-41, and suffering a plucking at the hands of Nixyaawii 56-47.

Despite the three-point loss in the Jan. 20 Helix game, Joseph coach Travis Huffman saw bright spots. "We scored 22 points to their 12 in the first quarter. The girls are doing real well for a quarter or quarter-and-a-half, and for some reason we just run out of gas. We just need to find a way to keep that momentum going."

Huffman included another bright point: three players scoring in double figures. Satori Albee and Alexis Sykora led the scoring with 12 apiece (Albee scoring six in the final quarter), followed by Lindsay Kemp with 10. Unfortunately, the team's total shooting percentage factored out at .247.

Huffman expressed pride in the E-Gals regardless of the loss to Nixyaawii, saying Joseph played much better than the previous outing against Helix. "I don't think anyone really expected us to compete with them, but the girls did a really good job and stayed right with them," Huffman said.

The E-Gals clawed their way up to only a four-point deficit in the fourth quarter before Nixyaawii started sinking free throws to put the game out of reach.

Albee led the scoring with 20 points, while Sykora scored nine and Kemp finished with six. The team shot a.312 field goal percentage. Huffman theorized that other teams, hearing of Sykora's skills, are double-teaming her, which leaves Albee open for more scoring opportunities. Huffman said that once Albee and Sykora start clicking together as players that he expects the duo to inflict serious damage against opponents.

"When these Joseph girls start to 'get it,' they'll be a lot of fun to watch," Huffman
