



EHS track women edge out E-Gals

Outlaw men far outpace runner-up Elgin

JOSEPH — Fueled in part by Karianne Zollman and Ally Cooney's first- and second-place finishes in the javelin, Cooney and Maddie Bailey's one-two placings in the triple jump, and Isabelle Tingelstad's win in the 3,000 meters, Joseph's track and field women gave Enterprise's winning team a run for their money Saturday at the JoHi Invite, where Enterprise took first in both the men's and women's divisions.

While Joseph women's

points total of 129 wasn't far behind Enterprise's 144, the Outlaw men far outdistanced runner-up Elgin, 247-144.5. The Enterprise men took firsts in the 4x100 and 4x400 relays, the 110 and 300 meter hurdles, the long jump and triple jump, discus, shot put, and races of 100, 800 and 1,500 meters.

The invitational at Joseph Charter School drew eight men's teams and five women's teams and was held in pleasant, shirtsleeve weather. Below are individual results for
