Bullheads in Kinney Lake slated for termination

While most people think of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife as protectors of wildlife, that role of protector can turn into that of terminator if one species threatens the existence of another. In this case, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife is planning to poison the 210-acre Kinney Lake in an effort to reduce the lake's bullhead population for the benefit of trout.

Bullheads are a type of catfish, and edible, but the competition for food with the lake's trout is having negative impacts on both species. Consequently, the ODFW plans to poison the bullhead this fall when lake water level is low and relatively fished out of trout.

Kinney Lake is approximately 12 miles from Enterprise and is a popular fishing hole. The lake is privately owned although the ODFW worked out a 1965 agreement with the landowner and the irrigation district to maintain the lake and keep it stocked with fish. The lake is fed by an irrigation canal belonging to Wallowa Valley Improvement District #1. The outlet flows into a continuation of the canal.

At a May 6 meeting at Cloverleaf Hall, ODFW employees Kyle Bratcher and Jeff Yanke presented an outline of the ODFW plan to about a half-dozen attendees.

Bratcher said the bullhead are non-native and during a

recent count of 38 bullhead currently in the lake, the largest fish was only 8 inches long and did not even weigh four ounces. The ODFW interpreted this as a sign that food sources were already low. Bratcher explained that the removal of bullheads would improve catch rates and improve fish health while allowing for the possibility of "holdover" trout to survive the winter and low water levels.

The ODFW stocks the lake with "triploids, or sterile fish, because the lake water levels are generally too low to accommodate a self-sustaining trout population during the late summer and winter months. Triploids grow faster as well.

The method used to rid the lake of bullheads is the application of a certified organic-base poison called Rotenone. It is a toxicant composed of plant leaves, seeds and roots. It works on a cel-

lular level by prohibiting the exchange of oxygen between cells. Bratcher stressed it is not harmful to land-based wildlife and breaks down in about two to three weeks with no harmful byproducts. As it is immo-

bile in soils, it has no danger of

seeping into ground water.

Bratcher said the ODFW used Rotenone treatment in other Oregon lakes with a great deal of success. The plan is to stock the lake with 5,000 rainbow trout and 500 trophy-sized trout over the summer. It will also lift fishing restrictions from July through September to leave as few trout in the lake as possible. In October the ODFW will spray the lake with Rotenone, a process that will take about two hours. "It's a real small project," Bratcher

After the Rotenone application, the lake is checked every few days for dead fish, which are collected and buried. After 2-3 weeks, a small number of trout are brought to the lake and kept in a water cage to determine if the poison has broken

During the public comment phase of the presentation, local rancher Todd Nash questioned the removal of the bullheads because they're easier to catch and many children who fish the lake are happy to catch anything. "We talk about bigger and better trout, but for a little kid, a bullhead is kind of a nice thing," Nash said. He also expressed concern about stocking trophy fish in the lake. "We get a lot of tourists in town, and once word gets out, you could have that lake filling up with tourists instead of local kids," Nash said.

"You have to pick one over the other, and that's what we're here for, to see where we're at," Bratcher said. Yanke added that the ODFW had spent years trying to establish a children's fishing pond at Knight's Pond at the Iwetemlaykin state heritage site without success, although he didn't rule out the idea's implementation in the future. "It's not our goal to create a high falutin' trophy fishery at Kinney Lake. Our goal is to have it be a productive fishery for locals — and some tourists," Yanke said.

The implementation of the plan is dependent on the approval of board of the irrigation district. Bratcher and Yanke presented their plan to the board on May 12 and expect a decision sometime in




