## **Parks and Recreation Commission visits**

The Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission met for the third time this year in Joseph at the Hurricane Creek Grange Hall on June 24. The two-day visit by the commission also included a June 23 tour which included the Iwetemlaykin Heritage Site, Wallowa Lake State Park and a viewing of the east moraine of Wallowa Lake.

The commission is composed of seven members: one member per Oregon's five voting districts as well as one member each west of the Coast Range and east of the Cascades. The commission sets nearly all policy for the OPRD. Director of Northeast Oregon Economic Development District, Lisa Dawson, is one of the commission's members.

The commission had a number of statewide items on its agenda for the meeting, with several of local concern.

Kathleen Ackley, director of Wallowa Land Trust, updated the commission on the work the Wallowa Lake Moraines Partnership, of which the OPRD is a partner. The partnership works with moraine landowners to retain the pristine and undeveloped nature of the moraines for future generations.

Ackley said she appreciates the OPRD interest in the moraines. "The moraines are part of the magical experiences of coming to Wallowa Lake State Park, so it's in their interest to see it protected. They bring a lot of expertise and resources to our partnership and we are glad they are committed to

this part of Northeast Oregon," Ackley said.

Bruce Ham, a Portland surgeon and part-time Wallowa County resident, is a moraine land and home owner who has worked with the Wallowa Land Trust to preserve the majority of his land for future generations. Ham asked about the OPRD vision of the future for the moraines and the impact of the moraine trail not just on the moraine itself, but on the moraine landowners and even on the state park at the head of Wallowa Lake. "I think a trail has some implications, and I just wondered if those things had been studied, or been formally addressed. That's what I was interested in," Ham said later. He added that he was not the only property owner affected by what goes on in the moraine area.

John Baker, of Wallowa, addressed the committee regarding the Joseph Branch Trail Consortium (rails with trail project). Baker thanked the commission for its support of the consortium. Chris Havel, the public af-

fairs officer for the commission, said they enjoyed their Wallowa County stay. "We have a deep affection for Oregon's northeast. We never tire of the beauty and history of this landscape. Iwetemlaykin is a pretty simple park, but the heritage of that 62 acres is fascinating, and we all enjoyed Tim Nitz (of the National Park Service) bringing it to life for us on the tour ... When our commission chair, Jay Graves, says this is among his favorite places in Oregon and the world, he means it," Havel said.

# Forest Plan revisers schedule workshops

The U.S. Forest Service's Blue Mountains Forest Plans Revision Team has added three workshop dates in Enterprise — at Cloverleaf Hall Monday, July 13, Tuesday, July 21, and Tuesday, July 28, all three nights from 6 to 9 p.m. — to its list of July and August gatherings in various communities.

The team is involved in updating Forest Plans across the Blue Mountains national forests — including the Wallowa-Whitman, heur, and Umatilla national forests. Current Forest Plans are from 1990, and over the past 25 years, the landscape has changed significantly, the

Forest Service notes. Social and economic conditions have also changed across the Blue Mountains region since 1990. New Forest Plans are to guide future land-management deci-

In summer of 2014, the Forest Service asked the public to comment on its draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) related to the Blue Mountains Forest Plans, and USFS received over 1,300 comment letters during the comment period. Based on the comments received and the feedback shared in public meetings, the Forest Service notes an overall sense of dissatisfaction with the Forest

Plans from diverse perspectives

In a recent cover letter accompanying the meetings schedule, the Forest Plan Revision Team states that it hopes to better understand and respond to the feedback before finalizing the Forest Plans. Some of the topics deemed deserving of more discussion are: (1) access, (2) grazing, and (3) pace and scale of restoration.

Most of the upcoming community workshops or meetings will be professionally facilitated by Jack Southworth of High Desert Partnership. Members of the public are invited to contribute their knowledge and perspectives, and also to be open to others who may have different information and perspectives. "During these workshops, we will work together to find zones of agreement, new ideas, and creative solutions that will help us improve the draft Forest Plans," the cover letter explains.

Enterprise's July 13, 21 and 28 workshops are focused, respectively, on access (13th), grazing (21st), and pace and scale of restoration (28th). For the complete schedule of workshops in all counties, visit http://tinyurl. com/p7dhwy2/.
