Summer camp still delights youngsters

The excited voices of children at morning activities can nearly be heard when driving through the gate at the Buhler Ranch, home to the yearly Chief Joseph Summer Camp. While some may say children have forsaken the healthy outdoor life for the wizardry of video games, youth filled every available slot at this year's camp.

It is the camp's 54th year, and took place from July 13-17 with 144 children attending. Camp was held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. the first four days, ending at 2 p.m. on the last day, at a cost of \$90 per child for the week.

Attendance is limited to children entering grades 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, with nearly all the attending children from Wallowa County. The camp has a number of counselors, volunteers and even interns borrowed from Wallowa Resources to supervise and help with activities.

Children do not stay overnight at the camp, which provides transportation to and from designated areas throughout the county for children who attend. Stacy Green is chairman of the CJSC board and also teaches journalism to the children with the idea of publishing a camp newspaper. Green is a longtime devotee, as well as former attendee of the camp. "Our main goal here is to provide a week of fun, but also to sneak in some worthy science, education and art," she said.

Although plenty of fun and games are available, the children are divided into cooperative groups that work on a particular project for a portion of the morning, which is presented to the camp at the end

of the week. The camp newspaper, the camp store and a class on the history of wiring were among the projects this year. Workshops are also offered. Green said part of the fun and games include crafts as well as plenty of physical opportunities for the adventurous, including rope swings, archery, zip lines, slip 'n' slides and other activities.

Bernadette Matthews, in her second year attending the camp, echoed Green's enthusiasm. "This was so much fun, I wanted to come again. My favorite part is the newspaper because I like to write and type and stuff," Matthews said.

With the popularity of the camp, Green urges parents to sign their children up as early as possible. She added the camp keeps a waiting list in the case of cancellations and that few are turned away. Unfortunately, enthusiasm and high attendance at the camp don't pay the bills. CJSC board member and treasurer, Peg Nave, is worried about funding. Between insurance, transportation and other expenses, the camp costs over \$20,000 to operate for the week. "We haven't gotten the sponsors we normally get this year. We're hoping to get people to sponsor individual kids, because we had an abnormally high number of people requesting scholarships this year, and that's where a funding crisis is coming into play," Nave

She also said the camp takes donations year-around and contributions are tax-deductible. "It's not only a great experience for the kids, it's a great work experience for the counselors too. It's a huge benefit to the kids of this county," Nave said.
