100 YEARS AGO
October 7, 1915

By order of the Public Service commission of Oregon, the city of Enterprise is empowered to extend Depot street south across the tracks of the O-W railroad. The extension will run close to the east end of the Woolgrowers' warehouse, and will give the city an outlet to the south and southwest now lacking. At a hearing set in Enterprise, the railroad objected strenuously, on the ground that

the proposed crossing would be dangerous. The city took the ground that it wanted the crossing at Depot street or not at all.

The people of Flora are to be congratulated on their new schoolhouse, occupied now for the first time. It is the newest, and in many respects the best school building in the county, as regards completeness and efficiency of equipment.

merce was held at the Caton hotel Tuesday evening under the direction of the new officers, I. E. Snyder, president, and M. J. Rutherford, secretary. Approximately 35 members were on hand and several guests. Actions taken were the adoption of a resolution favoring the establishment of a state park at Wallowa Lake, and the endorsement of a permit sought by J. N. Daugherty to resume operation of the Lewiston-Enterprise stage. A resolution was adopted to petition the state highway commission to re-paint the yellow line in the center of the highway and to erect a guard rail along the road around Wallowa Lake.

Secretary of State Robert Farrell has awarded a plaque to the city of Enterprise in recognition of the city's excellent traffic safety record in 1944. The plaque, a second place award for cities up to 2000 population was presented to Mayor M. J. Rutherford.

a True-Life Story of HOW YOUR TELEPHONE HELPS GET THINGS DONE

The publisher of one of the fine weekly newspapers in the area served by the West Coast Telephone Company needed a lino-type operator not long ago. How he obtained a new employee, and how his telephone helped solve this problem, becomes an interesting story.

First, this newspaper man picked up his telephone and called long-distance to a larger city not far away, and placed a classified "help wanted" ad in the daily paper there.

One of the persons who read this ad had a friend whose husband happened to be a lino-type operator. So she picked up her telephone and called her friend to tell her about this employment possibility.

This woman's husband was seeking work in a Mid-West city at the time, so his wife placed a long-distance telephone call to him to tell him about the ad.

So the husband, in turn, telephoned long distance to the newspaper publisher, and with his telephone interview, he got the job.

Once again, as happens over and over again, day after day, the telephone helped solve a problem that otherwise might have been impossible.
