The extension of Depot Street across the railroad tracks south to the county road was assured on Monday when the O-W. R&N Co. accepted the \$50 awarded as damages by the viewers. There had been fears that the railroad would take the matter into court and seek to block the city.

Electric lights have been put up in the county road by the homes of J.A. Eggleston and Jay H. Dobbin. At Mr. Eggleston's place the light is on a pole near the house, and at Mr. Dobbin's it is at the turn of

the road a few feet to the south of the home.

Mrs. Elise Miller is in charge of getting out the letters and cards. The county's quota is \$185,000 of which \$115,00 is to be E bonds.

Coleman Sundries in Joseph was burglarized last Wednesday night, Oct. 27, when a person or persons unknown gained entry to the building through the roof and made off with a quantity of watches and cigarettes. Using a brace and bit, the culprits bored 60 holes through the roof and kicked out the ceiling tile over the furnace room to gain access to the store proper.

State opens health care enrollment

As of Nov. 1, Oregonians can now sign up, renew or change their health insurance plans at the state site HealthCare.gov.

Open enrollment began Nov. 1 and goes through Jan. 31, 2016. It is the time of the year to change plans or to buy a plan and avoid a potential penalty on 2016 taxes.

"Even if you already have insurance, take some time during open enrollment to look at all of your options through the marketplace," said Patrick Allen, director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services (DCBS). "Prices and plans — as well as your health needs — may have changed considerably. You also may qualify for financial help."

Financial help is available for many people if they enroll through HealthCare.gov. Depending on their income, they may qualify for tax credits to help pay their monthly premium and assistance with out-of-pocket costs such as deductibles and co-pays. Of the approximately 107,000 Oregonians who enrolled through HealthCare.gov for 2015, more than 77,000 received a premium tax credit averaging \$199 per month.

Oregon has a network of insurance agents and community organizations ready to help people enroll. You can find an agent or community partner in your area by going to www.oregonhealthcare.gov/get-help.html or by calling the Oregon Health Insurance Marketplace at 1-855-268-3767 (toll-free).

While open enrollment lasts through Jan. 31, 2016, you need to apply by Dec. 15 if you want to ensure you have coverage on Jan. 1, 2016. Most consumers who already have insurance through HealthCare.gov or directly through an insurance company will be re-enrolled in their same plan if they do not act by Dec. 15.
