"So far there has not been an outside contractor except the architect/engineer, and I offered that job to the local guys and they didn't have the architecture portion," Royse

The new south-end buildsite was for the Snack Shack and the track equipment shed, both of which were originally sited next to the field house and will now be moved.

The field house itself will be reconstructed in its original location at the north end of the field.

The new facility may be larger than the old one, but those plans are still up in the air as the district awaits their insurance check.

Royse said the district still has no idea what their insurance settlement will be, but that every conversation about the field house — built over the years of 1949-1952 was about how well constructed the building was.

"The good news is that means we'll get more money from the insurance," Royse said.





