100 YEARS AGO April 27, 1916

• Under the direction of their teacher, Miss Josie A. Butterfield, eighth grade pupils of Joseph visited Enterprise last week. They had planned to walk down, but four owners of automobiles would not listen to this and brought them down in their cars. While the chief object of interest in town was the plant of the East Oregon Lumber company, the pupils made their first stop at the Record Chieftain shop where they were most cordially welcomed.

• An experiment with the object of learning whether the old red fish that filled the lake and the streams of the county in early days, can be brought back is being made by the state fish and game commission. A total of six cars or 2,100,000 fish will be planted in the lake.




