# Amy Hafer Race this Saturday

The Wallowa Valley Health Care Foundation is sponsoring the 9th annual Amy Hafer Race for Cancer Awareness at 9 a.m. Saturday.

The event takes place at Wallowa Memorial Hospital in Enterprise and offers a 1-mile walk, a 5k walk/run and a 10k run. The event begins at 9 a.m. and is open to walkers and runners of all abilities.

The Amy Hafer Race is named in honor of 1989 Wallowa High School graduate Amy Hafer, who lost her battle with breast cancer in 2007 at the age of 38. Hafer's uncle, local artist Tim Norman, donates each year the trophies for first-place finishes, beautiful, bronze dragonflies — a tribute to his niece who loved dragonflies.

The purpose of the event is to encourage everyone to make healthy lifestyle choices, including physical exercise and eating healthy food, and to get regular screenings so that cancer can be caught at its earliest stage.

Two local organizations have been raising money through their own efforts to donate to Wallowa Memorial Hos-

night; Soroptimist of Wallowa County donates money each year as well.

The Amy Hafer Race is supported by generous sponsors, including Bank of Eastern Oregon, Legacy Ford in La Grande, Viridian Management, Winding Waters Clinic and Wallowa Valley Center for Wellness.

The event includes a healthy buffet of fresh fruit, healthy bites, and spa water, as well as door prizes, ribbons and awards for first place finishes.

"We've been lucky and usually had good weather," said Foundation board member Terry Jones, who will emcee the event.

However, last year it was unusually hot, so participants are advised to bring their own water bottles to make sure they stay hydrated.

Early registration is open until the end of the day on Wednesday, June 22. After that, same-day registration goes into effect, and racers can show up Saturday to register at the door. Those showing up Saturday to register should plan on arriving at 8 a.m., according to Foundation director Stacy Green. ## Wallowa Resources' Watershed Festival delivers family fun

Wallowa Resources hosts its twelfth annual Watershed Festival from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday at the Wallowa County Fairgrounds. The festival gives families a chance to connect with and learn about organizations serving the county while enjoying outdoor summer fun.

"The purpose is to celebrate this amazing place and

to provide summer learning opportunities," said event coordinator Amy Busch.

More than 25 organizations ranging from Fishtrap, which promotes "clear thinking and good writing in and about the West," to Building Healthy Families, which strengthens families through education and support, will come together to share what they do with the community through family-friendly activities.

A scavenger hunt will send kids searching for stickers and facts about Wallowa County to earn a prize upon completion. Kids can see live birds of prey, build birdhouses, tag fish, make paper, and much more.

Wallowa Valley Music Alliance will once again be hosting the music for the event from 11:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Victor Johnson, who specializes in kid-friendly music, will perform as well as many other

local musicians.

"Bring a sun hat and sunscreen and a blanket to sit and enjoy the music," Busch said.

Festival goers can also grab lunch since Wallowa Resources'

will be providing free hot dogs and chips at the event.

Admission is free, and the first 200 families also will receive a free reusable grocery bag.

## Dulcimer Week in the Wallows returning

Dulcimer enthusiasts should be aware that the sixth annual Dulcimer Week in the Wallows is returning to the area July 3-9. The week-long musical instructional retreat for adults takes place at the United Methodist Church camp at the head of Wallowa Lake. The camp is hosted by local musicians Heidi Muller and Bob Webb and sponsored by the Wallowa Valley Music Alliance.

In fact, the week is so popular among Appalachian mountain dulcimer enthusiasts that the only classes that remain unfilled are the beginner classes.

"We filled up so quickly. ... We'd love to have more people," Muller said.

Two-thirds of this year's 30 to 35 participants are returnees from the previous year. Some are coming from as far away as southern California and Florida.

"We always have some new people, and we draw them from far away," Muller said.

Although the camp takes place over the Fourth of July weekend, it's not a bother to participants.

"Our people are fine with that," Muller said. "They get to see fireworks at the lake."

Other draws include the camp's guest instructors for this year, dulcimer phenoms

Steve Eulberg from Southern California and Carol Walker of New Jersey.

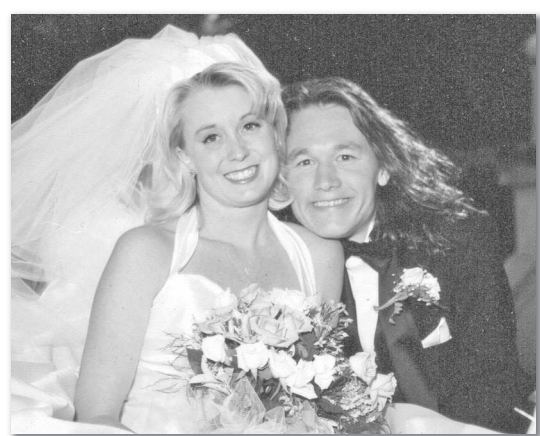
Eulberg, who will teach intermediate and advanced classes, is a five-time Winfield, Kansas National Winner in Mountain Dulcimer and a three-time National Finalist for Hammered Dulcimer.

Walker will teach advanced-beginners and intermediate classes. She is a specialist in "Manx" music — folk songs from the Isle of Man off Scotland's coast. She also is a top-five finisher at the Winfield, Kansas World Dulcimer Championships.

The classes run from 8:30-11:30 a.m. with a number of elective classes offered in the afternoon. All the instructors

will teach electives, which include classes on the blues and songs from the 1960s and other offerings, so students have a broad range of styles to choose from. Open mics and jam sessions are part of the evening fare.

As the beginners classes have some vacancies, the camp is offering one local student a \$150 scholarship toward the \$350 camp tuition. For those who have no dulcimer, Muller has a few to rent, although the rent fee can be waived if need-

Oregon Attorney General Ellen Rosenblum filed a lawsuit against several manufacturers of liquid crystal display ("LCD") flat panels for illegal price fixing. The Attorney General has settled with all Defendants for a total of \$21,505,000, and eligible consumers are entitled to money back!

#### Who Is Included?

If you purchased a flat panel TV, monitor or laptop with an LCD flat screen in Oregon between 2002 and 2006, you may be entitled to money! The device must have been purchased from someone other than the company that manufactured the flat panel component, such as from an electronics retailer or a device manufacturer other than one of the Defendants. The purchase must have been for personal use, not business use.

#### What Are My Rights And Options?

**File a claim:** Consumers need to file a claim to obtain benefits in this settlement. Claims can be completed online at [www.OregonScreenSettlement.com](http://www.OregonScreenSettlement.com) or by mailing the claim form, available for download at the website, to the Settlement Administrator. The deadline for filing claims is September 20, 2016. State and local government entities will receive a share of the settlement automatically and do not need to file a claim.
