That was followed by a successful onside kick that caught the Vikings completely off guard. Umatilla had success at times with its no-huddle attack, mixing in sweeps and dives with a few mid-range passes. But overall the Enterprise defense came up big throughout the night. The Outlaws offense also moved the ball well at times. Senior Trent Bales punished the Umatilla defensive line and moved the ball three or four yards at a time for most of the night. Senior quarterback Tate Olsen was effective in the short-passing game, connecting on nine of 20 attempts for 67 yards. Several of his incom-

pletions came late in the game when the Umatilla defense was sitting back in full coverage. “We have to find a way to win,” Rowley said. “Which means we have to have play-makers. We’re finding a way. We’re getting there. We’re still fine-tuning things right now.” Junior defensive back Trent Walker did his part to keep the Vikings in check. Walker broke up one deep pass in the first half and picked off another in the third quarter. And sophomore defensive lineman Klint Norton disrupted the Umatilla offense throughout the evening and recorded multiple tackles for a loss. The Outlaws have a bye this week, then travel for a road game against Pilot Rock/Nixy-aawii at 7 p.m. Sept. 30.

Eagles stumble against Mustangs

The Joseph football team suffered a 54-26 loss to Jordan Valley in North Powder on Saturday.

The Eagles lead 18-6 early in the third quarter, despite losing running back Cayden DeLury to a hip-pointer injury at the end of the second quarter.

“It didn’t come out like we expected it to,” Eagles coach Toby Koehn said. “We played hard, physical football into the third quarter until they started to throw on us very effectively. We still need to learn how to finish a game.”

Senior Logan Welch led the Eagles ground game with 132 yards on 11 carries. He also had seven solo tackles on defense.

DeLury rolled up 122 yards on 18 carries and two touchdowns in his half of play. Koehn said he expects DeLury will return for Friday’s game in Wallowa.

Rylie Warnock served as lead tackler for the Eagles, crunching the Mustangs with 11 solo tackles.

“He was pretty aggressive,” Koehn said.

Cougars drop pair of matches

Wallowa had some close sets last week but ultimately the Cougars were swept on the road at Powder Valley (25-16, 25-13, 25-18) on Thursday and at home against Cove (25-23, 25-17, 25-18) on Saturday.

“This team is improving every day,” said head coach Janea Hulse. “We were brought down by an injury and the majority of the team was down with either the flu or a very severe cold.”

The Cougars (1-10) had several intense rallies against Powder Valley (7-2), but sometimes struggled to pick up the ball on defense, Hulse said.

Jamie Johnston was very aggressive, picking up 17 digs on defense and 18 passes on serve receive. She also had two kills, one solo block and no errors on serving.

Jordan Ferre recorded seven solo blocks with two assists.

“She was doing well in placing the ball on offense,” Hulse said. “Grace Pendarvis did well on hitting, she was very consistent.”

Rylee Goller led the team with four kills and 11 solid hits.

At home against 1A Cove (3-7), Wallowa took an early lead, but struggled to finish the set and lost 25-23.

Johnston, Goller, and Riley Ferre each had four kills. Jordan Ferre had seven solo blocks and Johnston had six solo blocks.

“Ashlyn Young did a good job setting and is learning the strengths and power of her hitters,” Hulse said. “She is

moving the ball around and is improving every game.”

Wallowa hosts Joseph (9-2) at 4 p.m. Friday.

Outlaws hit stride at home

Enterprise made the long trip to Baker City on Saturday, but returned home after just two sets. The Outlaws (3-7) fell 25-14, 25-19 to 4A La Grande (5-6) in bracket play at the Baker Tournament before their second opponent forfeited.
