100 YEARS AGO Nov. 23, 1916

• With 19 divorce suits on the docket, Circuit court convened Monday morning. The growth of divorce litigation has been marked for several years. The number of suits on the present docket marks a high water mark.

• In the course of their investigation of the various county offices, the grand jury recommended that the county purchase and present a wig to F.A. Clarke, deputy county clerk. He needs it.

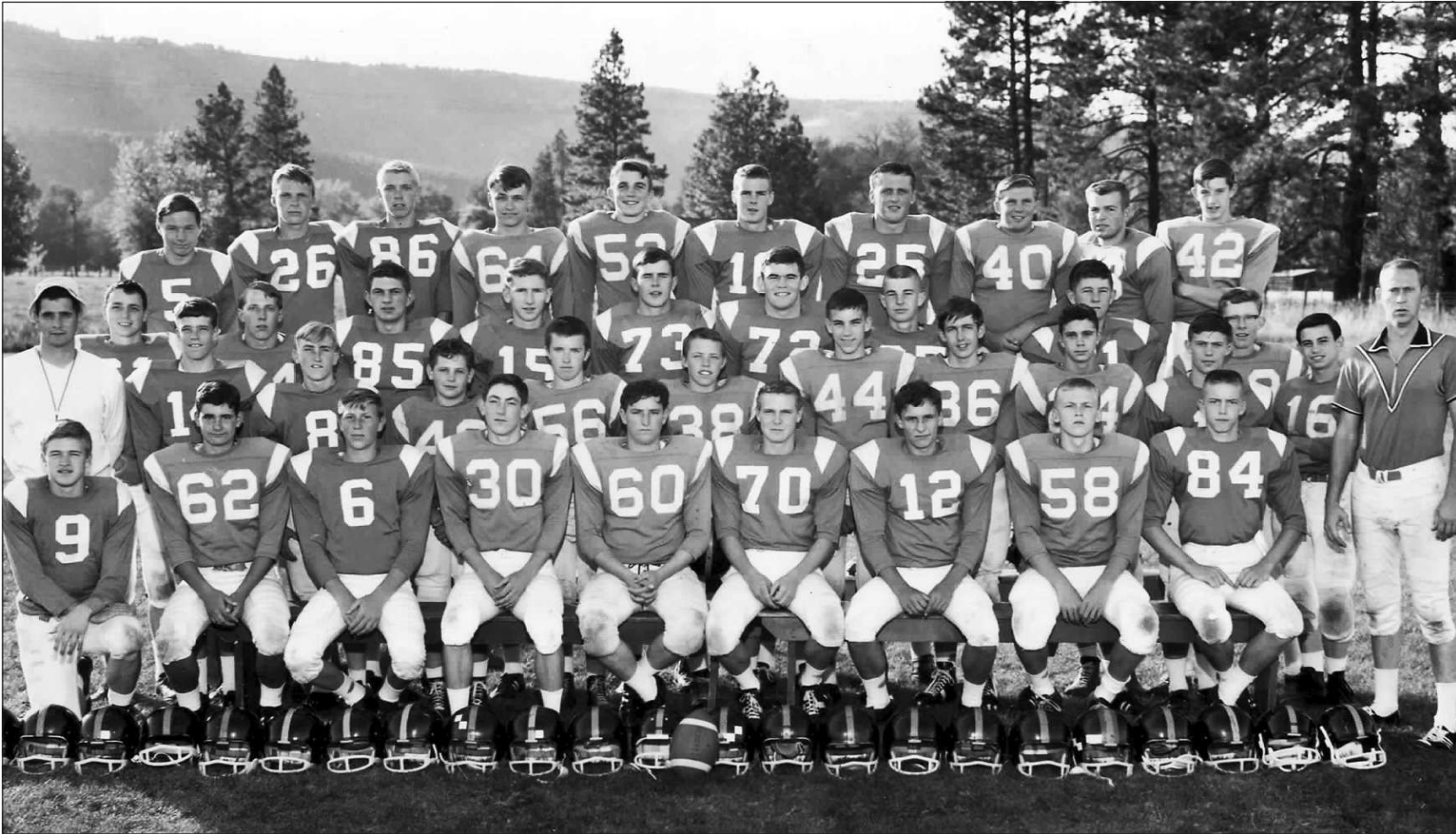
• Further steps toward having street names posted and houses numbered in Enterprise was taken by the city council Monday night. Samples of numbers with prices will be obtained by the council and if the cost is not too great the city may have them placed on all houses. Thus every building could be numbered uniformly and at once.

• Two ordinances were passed by the city council, one requiring a meat peddler to have a city license, and the other forbidding the driving of loose stock on streets around the heart of town. Stock being driven thru town has become troublesome at times on business streets, and also has done considerable damage in the residence districts.

• The forest office in Wallowa has been notified that the grazing fees are to be doubled within the next three years. The present rate for cattle on this forest is 60 cents for a year long period.

70 YEARS AGO Nov. 21, 1946

• The Lions club plans to put in a lighting system and a fireplace at the Franklin-Thompson pond south of town in order to make it more

convenient and comfortable for skaters this winter. The fire department will sprinkle the pond to provide smoother ice when necessary.

• Settlement of the condemnation suit by the state highway department against T.H. Williamson this week cleared the last remaining obstacles to the establishment of a state park at the head of Wallowa Lake. The Williamsons have agreed to accept and the state has agreed to pay \$17,500 for approximately 55 acres of the Williamson land.

• Junior Red Cross enrollment in this county is 100 percent, every district where school is maintained having enrolled and sent in their dues. Quite a lot of money has come in for service, most of which will go into the children's fund.

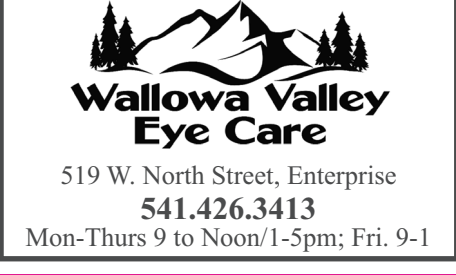


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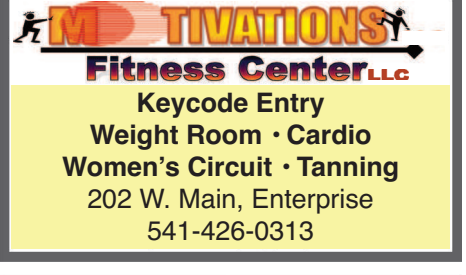


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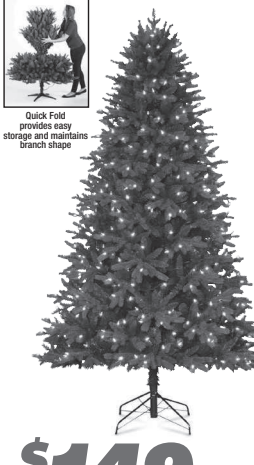
