100 YEARS AGO
February 8, 1917

• The Enterprise hotel, a landmark in town since the days before the railroad came, is to be remodeled and modernized this summer. One change that is recognized as desirable cannot be made, as the difficulties in the way are too great. The level of the first floor is two feet or so above the sidewalk. This will have to be left undisturbed.

• A meat packing plant is practically assured for Enterprise in the coming season. Several men with ample financial backing and practical experience have been quietly perfecting plans for the new industry. They will be ready to make a formal announcement in a short time.

• Reports of the snow storm that swept the county last week have come in from all points. From Promise: We still have lots of snow and the roads are in a bad condition. One building collapsed under the heavy snow. Our stage driver only made two trips this week, it taking him 4 days to make the first.

• Enterprise won another overwhelming (basketball) victory Friday night, defeating Joseph, 49 to 21. The visitors came down with two teams and about 60 supporters, but it was all in vain. Mr. Irvine, the Joseph coach, refereed the first half of the game and Mr. Jory, the Enterprise coach, the second.

70 YEARS AGO
February 6, 1947

• The Enterprise chamber of commerce voted Tuesday night to underwrite the purchase of a new athletic field for the school at an estimated cost of around \$1,600 with additional sums needed for improvements. The school has been without an athletic field, with football games being held on the airport and golf grounds.

• The Wallowa County Dairy and Boyd's Dairy have announced that the shortage of milk bottles is so serious that

it may be necessary to require an empty bottle exchange for every bottle of milk sold, and possibly some curtailment of sales will also be necessary.

• It was announced by Ben Weathers that an able veterinarian would move here with his family in March and devote his full time to veterinarian work in the county.

• Flora news: Mr. Stanley with the help of the pupils has been getting ready to install two shower baths in the basement of the school house and they have erected a bar on which to exercise.

• Wallowa news: A hand-

kerchief shower was given in honor of Mrs. E.B. Johnson last week at the home of Mrs. Zielke.

• The Enterprise City Council passed an ordinance to license liquor clubs and fixed the license fee at \$600 per annum. Members of the city council have expressed the hope that a liquor club will help eliminate some of the drinking in cars and alleys.
