# EAGLES COME ALIVE IN OPENER

The Wallowa Valley Eagles split their season opener at Pilot Rock losing their first game 11-10, despite a 4-for-5 plate performance by junior Rylie Hayward, but soared back in the second game for a 5-4 victory.

Coach Dick Johnson was pleased with Eagles' effort in the split.

"We could have won game one, but we made some early-season mistakes in the third and fourth innings," he said.

The Eagles used pitchers Tate Olsen, Chris Bathke and Rylie Hayward in the game. Pitching stats were unavailable for either game.

The Eagles kept their bats warm during the opening contest with Hayward pounding out a double and 4 RBIs. Bathke went 2-for-5 at the plate with a homer and RBI. Christopher Nobles was 1-for-3 with an RBI while Dylan Staigle brought in 2 RBIs. Gus Ramsden pulled off an anomaly: He stepped up to the plate five times but never racked up an official at-bat. He walked four times and hit one sacrifice fly, leaving Ramsden with an .800 on-base percentage along with his three runs scored.

"I've never seen that before ever," assistant coach Geoff Hayward said.

The bottom end of the twin bill proved more satisfying for the Eagles as they walked away with the win.

Once again, the Eagles outit the Rockets 7-3. Hayward again led by going 2-for-3 with a RBI while Ramsden was 2-for-4 with a double and RBI. Clayne Miller was 1-for-3 with 2 RBIs.

However, it wasn't the veterans who most impressed coach Johnson.

"I was real pleased with the ability of younger kids, pleased with the way they all put the ball in play," he said. "Not everyone hit safely, but we had only one strikeout, while the rest hit the ball. It shows these young players are already making a contribution."

Player Rylie Hayward said he couldn't have had such a good day at the plate without Johnson having the confidence to let him hit fourth in the lineup.

"That allowed my teammates to consistently get into scoring position, which helped us," Hayward said.

He added that if the Eagles win their upcoming game in Elgin this week, that it would really motivate the team.

"We think we can compete. We have guys who can play anywhere on the field, and other teams should be looking out for us," he said.
