When the thrift shop opened in 1957, a \$50 high school scholarship was given. This year the organization gave \$24,000 in scholarships.

Soroptimists celebrate 60 years of thrift shop success

The Soroptimist Thrift Shop marked its 60th anniversary of operations Oct. 16 with an anniversary cake and door prizes.

The Wallowa County Soroptimist Club was chartered in 1947 and immediately began providing scholarships to high school graduates. In an effort to consolidate fundraising efforts and provide a much-needed service, the club voted to open a thrift shop and provide inexpensive clothing to families in need.

The current shop is in the basement of the Odd Fellows Hall next to the Enterprise Library. The original shop opened in the hallway of Harold's Dress Shop, which was in the now-defunct Haller building on the site of the Wallowa County Chamber of Commerce and Farmer's Insurance on River Street.

Wilma Haller, Mildred Clark and Ruth Aminino, the pioneers, called for donations of clothing, miscellaneous items and "white elephants." Soroptimist volunteers sorted and sold used items each Monday.

Within a year, the shop moved briefly into the old Stockdale building, now gone, then on to Main Street in the Berland building, now the EM&M building, and, finally in 1983, into the present Odd Fellows Hall. Each pace was larger than the previous, and the shop expanded its hours to include Tuesdays.

The shop took up residence in the Rebeka's dining hall in the basement of

the building. The long dining tables were stacked with clothing and housewares. The shop kept growing and expanded into the adjoining large room in the basement to offer more housewares, tools, small appliances, sporting goods and books.

Ruth Aminino worked every Monday from 1957-82. Vera Stonebrink worked at the shop 20 years (1963-83).

The shop is run completely by volunteers. The club estimates more than 6,700 service days have been logged.

For the past several years, the club has given annually \$24,000 in scholarships to Wallowa County students, \$8,500 to projects that directly benefit women, \$12,300 for various local donations and \$5,000 for a large grant program.

Recipients have included the Wallowa County Food Bank, Meals on Wheels. Senior Meals, Community Connection, Building Healthy Families, Safe Harbors, Wallowa Valley Youth Arts Festival, Blood Mobile, Deliver-Me-A-Book, Joseph Summer Camp, Wallowa Summer Read, FCCLA, International Projects as well as funding numerous requests from local organizations.


