100 YEARS AGO
Nov. 1, 1917

The potato market, which has been uncertain with a tendency to grow steadily weaker, suddenly became firm last week when agents of the U. S. Government came into the county buying supplies for area army camps. They paid 1 cent a pound and bought at least three carloads near Enterprise at that price. Deliveries are being made now.

Guy E. Skaggs has bought W.E. Keltner's ranch of 320 acres northwest of town and will farm it as a sideline to his hardware business.

A dance and basket supper will introduce the new stopping place on the Imnaha Road, the Midway House. Andrew Osmundson has erected a 15-room house, but the partitions are not in yet so

70 YEARS AGO
Oct. 30, 1947
