County 4-H team qualifies for nationals in Kentucky

Eleven 4-H members participated in the state event along with approximately 170 other 4-H'ers in several contests to show their knowledge in the horse project

The Intermdiate Hippology team of Vernam, Wecks, Fisher and Yaw placed eighth in the state. The Horse Bowl Team consisted of Devin Schreiber, Vernam, Yaw, Fisher and Wecks. Vernam placed first in the prepared public speaking contest. Harrod placed fourth in the intermediate presentation contest.

Vixen Radford-Wecks and Michelle Janick coached the teams and Jill Huffman coached the senior team presentation.

The event is designed to provide an educational forum in which youth enrolled in 4-H demonstrate their knowledge of equine related subject matter.
