ALLOWA — After a twoyear hiatus, the Wallowa Fiddle Tunes Camp returns this summer, July 10-15, to the campus of Wallowa Elementary School.

Registration is open now, and Robyn Burns, camp director, wants to remind everyone that the camp is happening once again.

"People are out of the habit of looking for us," she said.

Space is open for 100 campers. In typical years, Burns said, the registration is about 2/3 adults and 1/3 youth.

For younger campers, she said workshops are geared toward kids who have at least one year of music experience, or are age 9 and older.

There will be a mini camp for the younger children.
